25 ovs. to dozen. Uniform size.
Air cell less than 1-8 of an inch.
White—firm.
Yolk—dimly visible.
Shell—sound and clean.
Price, per doz. .45c.
- Extras—**
24 ovs. to the dozen—reasonably uniform size.
Air cell less than 1-4 of an inch.
White—firm.
Yolk—moderately visible.
Shell—sound and clean.
Price, per doz. .42c.
- Firsts—**
22 1/2 ovs. to dozen.
Air cell less than 3-8 of an inch.
White—firm.
Yolk—may be distinctly but moving freely.
Shell—sound and clean.
Price, per doz. .35c.
- Seconds—**
Eggs sound in shell—may be weak and watery—heavy yolks and all other eggs fit for food.
Price, per doz. .32c.

USES

- Specials—**
The best grade. Appetizing and healthful served alone or in combination with other foods.
Not on the markets at all seasons.
- Extras—**
Extras may be put to the same uses as specials, and they are always available.

At Queen's University

Queen's supplemental examinations concluded on Monday. It will likely be two weeks before the results are known, as several professors are away and some results have to come from distant points like British Columbia. Fall Convocation for the awarding of degrees to summer school students and others will be held early in October.

Registration for the fall term in arts and science will begin next Monday for students residing in the city, and for others on the following Saturday. An opportunity for registering was given students all summer and some availed themselves of it. Classes will open on September 24th, which is several days earlier than in the past, in order to allow for the mid-term examinations which are to be held before Christmas this year.

The Intercollegiate harrier meet is to be held at Queen's this fall. The date set is November 1st, when McGill meets Queen's here at rugby, and it is planned to have the race begin and end at the stadium during the football match. Queen's officials are now planning the course, which has to be nearly six miles, and includes a good deal of cross country running.
