THE HARVEST IS HAMPERED

By L.W.W. Gangs Imported From United States.

INTIMIDATE WORKERS

Several In Prison

Several have been rounded up in the Drumheller district and are now serving prison terms, while others are in jail in Calgary. It is said that efforts will be made to secure their release by appeal and a Calgary lawyer has been retained.

It is stated by police officials that these men work stealthily at all times and are doing little that would give the police an opportunity to fasten any charge, other than vagrancy, upon them. One of their favorite occupations, it is said, is to appear to be satisfied with their jobs with the farmers and then slip from bars or wrench into the stocks of grain, with disastrous result to the threshers when the sheaves are later fed in. There have also been threats to burn the threshing outfits, but none of those have been put into effect up to the present time.

TO LAY CORNER STONE

Of New Basilica at Ste. Anne de Beaupre.

Quebec, Sept. 9.—With all the imposing ritual of the Roman Catholic church the corner stone of the new Basilica to be constructed at Ste. Anne de Beaupre will be laid by His Eminence Cardinal Begin on Sept. 14th. The new structure will be one of the most beautiful church buildings on the continent and will be built from plans drawn by an eminent firm of French architects.

The new Basilica will stand on the site of the great church where miracles have been performed, known to many thousands of pilgrims throughout America, which was destroyed by fire in March, 1922. This church itself had replaced an older building incorporating parts of a chapel erected in 1865.

BIG PASSENGER BOAT BURNED IN DRY DOCK

The South American Destroyed at Holland, Mich.—Valued at \$500,000.

Holland, Mich., Sept. 9.—The steamship South American, one of the finest passenger boats on the Great Lakes, was destroyed by fire which broke out early this morning while the boat was in dry dock for the winter here. A crew of sixteen negroes, who had been cleaning the vessel, escaped.

The cause of the fire was undetermined. The boat, an oil burner, had 500 gallons of fuel oil stored near where the fire started and explosions of oil tore out large portions of the hull and endangered the lives of the firemen. Several cottages nearby were ignited, but the flames extinguished without material damage being done. The warehouse and dry dock were badly damaged.

The total loss is not yet estimated, but the vessel, which has been running for several years between Buffalo and Chicago, was valued at half a million dollars.

Hotel Kaaterskill in the Catskills, one of the largest mountain hostleries in the world, was destroyed by fire on Monday. Eleven hundred foreign marines have been ordered to take up defensive positions in the outskirts of Shanghai.

No Questions Yet Announced

Regarding the O.T.A. Plebiscite—Premier Ferguson Is Ill At Kemptville.

Toronto, Sept. 9.—It was learned today that there is little probability that the questions to be asked the electorate in the plebiscite in connection with the Ontario Temperance Act on Oct. 23rd will be announced by the Ontario Government before Thursday or Friday of this week. Premier Ferguson did not return today from his home in Kemptville, where he spent the week-end, and he is reported to be suffering from a chill, which will further delay his return.

The Ontario Telegram reiterates today that there will be but two questions submitted to the people, this being favored by the majority of the Conservative members of the House who have been consulted during the past few days.

HISTORICAL SCENES BEING REHEARSED

In Preparation for the Pageant at the Kingston Fair Next Week.

The armouries is a gay place this week, for the rehearsals of the various scenes of the great Kingston historical pageant are going on there. In the afternoon, Kingston's prettiest girls and brightest school children go through all sorts of pretty, graceful national dances. Britannia, Canada and Kingston lead their trains of matrons and maids in stately march, and Boy Scouts and Girl Guides are Indians, sailors or soldiers as the case may be. In the evening, the historical scenes are rehearsed.

On Monday the U. E. L. scenes were being practiced, and Capt. Michael Grant and his gallant band arrived from the land to the south in the forests of Canada. Many of the descendants of the original U. E. L. were among the actors who gathered around the camp fire in the forest, otherwise the floor of the armouries.

The second division of the U. E. L. scene is the taking of the oath of office by Governor Simcoe. In this scene, several of the actors are Queen's professors and members of the celebrated Faculty Players whose work as actors is well known. The declaration of the war of 1812 was read and the couriers (who will later be mounted) were on hand to carry the news to the outlying districts.

To-night, Count Frontenac will hold his pow-wow with the Indians, and during the week Col. Bradstreet will take Fort Frontenac for the British. Everyone is enjoying themselves, and Mr. Seboid, who has arrived to assist Mr. G. M. Miles in putting on a production of which Kingston will be proud, says he has never seen more enthusiastic and capable cast.

KILLS BRIDAL PAIR IN SLEEP

A Tragedy Enacted in Mott Street, New York.

GIRL BRIDE'S FATHER

Who Made Threats Knocked Down And Killed By Motor Truck.

New York, Sept. 9.—Margaret Giuca, 18 years old, known as the most attractive girl in Mott street, thought to find love and romance by eloping two weeks ago with the man who had won her affections. She was mistaken, as was disclosed yesterday when her bullet-torn body, and that of Carmelo Guica, her husband, who also had been shot to death, were found in the tiny two-room apartment at 133 Mott street, where they had established their home.

After an all-day search by the police for Giuseppe Gandolfo, father of the bride, who had urged her not to wed, on the plea that, being ill, he required her attendance on him, it was dramatically revealed that the murdered newweds and the girl's parents had been reunited in death. This discovery was made at the city morgue, after the bodies of the slain couple had been taken there. The father's body, which lay on a lower tier, was identified by his son, Thomas Gandolfo. Beside it, and quite by chance, had been placed the body of the son-in-law, while that of the girl had been allocated a space directly above.

The father had not taken his own life as might in the circumstances be suspected. By a strange turn of fate, he had been knocked down and fatally injured by a motor truck. He died at Beekman Street Hospital and his body was subsequently taken to the morgue, pending identification.

Although the police do not definitely charge that Gandolfo committed the double murder, they are convinced, considering the ferocity with which the deed was done, that something more than ordinary hatred was behind it. According to the story being investigated, the girl's father, after the elopement and marriage, had been permitted to make his home with the couple. But in spite of this, his resentment did not abate, and several days ago he is said to have declared in the midst of a stormy scene that he would kill his son-in-law as well as his daughter.

A BUFFALO GRAIN ELEVATOR BURNED

Three Men Slide to Safety—Blaze Does \$1,500,000 Estimated Damage.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 9.—The scorching elevator, containing six hundred thousand bushels of grain, was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon, with an estimated loss of \$1,500,000. Practically every available piece of fire apparatus in the city and two fire boats battled the flames in an effort to save surrounding property.

Three men caught on the top floor when the explosion occurred slid 150 feet to safety on a belt in the canal tower, a box-like structure on the side of the elevator. The elevator had a capacity of 750,000 bushels. Flames from the explosion believed to have been caused by the breaking of a belt in the cupola, spread rapidly.

MAN'S NUDITY EXPLAINED

Supposed Lunatic Was Taking T. H. Sun Cure.

Toronto, Sept. 9.—The mystery of the nude man, who was seen on several occasions recently in the vicinity of Milliken and Markham and who successfully eluded the police and search parties, has been solved. It seems that the man was a tuberculous patient from Toronto, and made daily trips on his motorcycle to an unfrequented spot where he divested himself of his clothing and took sun baths in a state "au naturel." The patient apparently felt secure from observation, but he was seen by some children, and the alarm was spread that a wild naked man was roaming the woods.

Princess Erik Recovered

Los Angeles, Sept. 9.—Princess Erik of Denmark, formerly Miss Frances Booth, of Ottawa, left the hospital where she had been treated for the last week for blood poisoning, following the extraction of a tooth. She returned to her home in Arcadia, accompanied by her husband and her mother, Mrs. J. Fred Booth. The latter arrived here Sunday from Ottawa. Physicians pronounce her condition as entirely satisfactory, there being no fear of a relapse.

COPY PRINCE'S SHOES

New York Men Ordering Brown Suede Footwear. New York, Sept. 9.—The Prince of Wales again wore the same gray check suit yesterday, giving another destructive blow to the myth of the prince's endless wardrobe. He wore also the same gray hat turned up on one side and down on the other. There were signs yesterday that he has set one fashion. He has been wearing brown suede shoes. It was asserted that there was not a male walking shoe of this unfinished leather in the United States before the prince set foot here, but yesterday brown suede shoes were visible on many a foot. Fashionable boot-makers are said to have been rushed with orders to produce this kind of footwear at lightning speed.

CARDINAL OBJECTS; DANCE CANCELLED

Permission to Hold Ball Aboard French Warship at Montreal Refused.

Quebec, Sept. 9.—That there has been no change in the attitude of his Eminence Cardinal Begin towards certain kinds of dancing was evidenced Sunday when Monsignor Lafamme, parish priest of the Basilica, again referred to the subject in addressing the faithful at all masses.

It had been reported that special permission had been given by the church for dancing on board the warships which have been anchored in the stream. Monsignor Lafamme, without touching on the question of whether the ships in the river were under the jurisdiction of the local episcopal authorities in so far as religious affairs are concerned, made it plain that immediate dances were nevertheless forbidden. He added that there had been no permission to hold the classes of dances that are banned. Inquiries made at the archbishop's palace elicited the information that permission sought in that sense had been refused.

A ball and a dance party which were to have been held on board the French man-o-war in the stream were cancelled yesterday morning.

JOB NOT SOUGHT

Position of Inspector-General of Banking Not Yet Filled.

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—The amended Bank Act, which calls for closer supervision of banking affairs by an inspector-general of banking comes into operation on Oct. 1st and an appointment will have to be made meanwhile.

It is understood that some difficulty is being encountered in getting the desired man. H. B. McKenzie, Montreal, and Grant McIntyre, Toronto, have been sounded out in connection with the appointment, but it is said that neither is inclined to accept.

Napanee, Sept. 9.—The streets of Napanee yesterday presented a most pleasing spectacle with their gay and brilliant decorations, put up in honor of the Old Boys' and Girls' visit to Napanee and the county to enjoy Old Home Week. WORLD FLIERS ARE GREETED

By Boom of Guns As They Reach New York.

PRINCE WAVES HIS HAT

As Aviators Descend—Fliers Expect To Finish Trip in Ten Days.

New York, Sept. 9.—With their historic world flight behind them, the American round-the-world aviators passed over New York City a little after 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and landed at Mitchell Field, Mineola, soon afterwards.

In a detour made in order to give the waiting millions of New York an opportunity to welcome them, the three world flight planes, accompanied by an escort of ten planes from Mitchell Field, passed over 42nd street at 3.15, passed over the Woolworth Building five minutes later, and then headed east over Brooklyn toward the flying field, where they came to earth.

A salute of twenty-one guns was immediately fired in honor of the fliers, and was followed by a salute of twenty-one guns in honor of the Prince of Wales, who arrived at the field at 3 o'clock and took his place in one of the boxes immediately opposite the reception stand. This twenty-one guns for Major-General salute was followed by one of Mason Patrick, head of air forces. The Prince of Wales, who had motored to the field for the occasion, stood in his box and waved his hat as the aviators taxied their machines to positions before the grandstand. Fifteen thousand persons were on the field.

The fliers start this morning on the flight to Bolling Field, Washington, passing over Philadelphia and Baltimore. They expect to reach Seattle and complete their circle of the globe within ten days.

MAN WHO THREATENED PRINCE ARRESTED

Is Found to be Mentally Unbalanced and Committed to an Asylum.

Williamstown, N.Y., Sept. 9.—Marcus J. Geroy was arrested in his home here yesterday charged with sending the Prince of Wales an alleged threatening letter received by the British here last Thursday. Sheriff Vincent, who made the arrest, said Geroy admitted writing the missive.

Sheriff Vincent added that Geroy denied threatening to kill the Royal visitor, but said he "had no use for the British Empire and would just as soon see it wiped out."

Geroy was arrested as he was leaving his home to take up residence in Northern Michigan. Later Geroy was taken to Pulaski for examination by physicians and upon their examination the man was declared unbalanced and was ordered committed to the State Hospital at Ogdensburg.
