BELLEVILLE'S U.E.L. MEMORIAL UNVEILED

By Lieutenant-Governor Cockshutt—Soldiers' Memorial Is to Be Erected.

"This memorial is erected to commemorate the 140th anniversary of the landing of the United Empire Loyalists in Ontario in the year 1784 A.D.

"The corner stone was laid on the seventh day of June and the monument was unveiled on the eighth day of September, 1924, A.D."

A miniature log cabin on a concrete base bearing this inscription, erected at the entrance to Victoria Park, was unveiled at Belleville on Monday afternoon by His Honor Col. Harry Cockshutt, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, in the presence of a thousand people.

The date of the unveiling was the 141st anniversary of the setting sail from New York City of seven shiploads of Loyalists bound on a 2,000-mile journey to the Bay of Quinte district, where they arrived on June 16th, 1784, the anniversary of which was celebrated at Belleville last June. Belleville is the first city in Canada to honor these pioneers with a memorial.

Addresses were given by Lt.-Col. S. S. Lazier, president of the U.E.L. celebration corporation, 1924, by the lieutenant-governor, by W. H. Herrington, K.C., Napanee, and by Major Mikel, who instituted the holding of the June celebration.

Col. Lazier gave notice of a plan to erect a soldiers' memorial on the armories lawn.

The memorial, which is of concrete, stands 14 feet high. The base measures 16 by 8 feet. It is provided with seats. Above it is the pedestal on which rests the miniature log cabin.

CANADA IS HELD UP AS MODEL TO BRITAIN

Beaverbrook's Praises Used by Labor Organ as Socialist Argument.

London, Sept. 9.—Canada's success with government ownership of railways is advanced to-day by the Daily Herald, the British Labor organ, as a reason for the nationalization of British roads. As its authority for claiming that Canada has made a success of state operation, The Herald quoted Lord Beaverbrook, who in to-day's Sunday Express sets out some impressions of his recent visit to the Dominion that should be very gratifying to its citizens.

Beaverbrook notes that the Canadian dollar is now at par on the New York exchange, and asks to how many Europeans this will come as a surprise. The parity of its dollar, he says, is a reflection of Canada's prosperity. The Dominion has no idle system, and its permanent unemployed are those with physical incapacity or mental distaste for hard work.

The Canadian banking system is the soundest and strongest in the world. Dominion problems are purely internal, and for this reason the banker rather than the politician is king in Canada. In the hierarchy of the financial world, says Lord Beaverbrook, Sir Vincent Meredith holds foremost place, and in the world of industry Sir Herbert Holt. Canada, he says, enjoys good governments, and their working is demonstrably more efficient than that of the United States. They have proven it in their successful struggle to improve their ruinous heritage of bankrupt trans-continental railways. Lord Beaverbrook concludes by urging British youth to go to Canada and grow up with a growing country.
