### Flying of British Flag Demanded by Council

Campbellford, Sept. 11.—At a meeting of the council the clerk was instructed to write Superintendent A. L. Killaly, of the Trent canal, requesting him to instruct the lockmasters to allow no boats to pass through the locks unless they flew the British flag. A. H. McKeel, ex-reeve of the town, informed the council that many American yachts passing up and down the Trent canal failed to fly the British flag. The council's resolution followed his suggestion that the council take some action to compel these visitors to comply with international regulations.
