Utilization of water power going to waste at Jones' Falls on the Rideau, where there is a drop of sixty-five feet, is embodied in an investigation of the power possibilities of the region which will shortly be undertaken by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission at the instance of A. W. Gray, member of the legislature for Leeds. By conserving water in the lakes to the rear, it is estimated 2,500 horsepower may be developed at this point.

Death of Dr. Edward Kidd.
The death occurred at Trenton on Aug. 25th of one of Trenton's well known and prominent citizens, Dr. Edward Kidd. The late doctor, who was seventy-six years of age, was a native of Lanark county. Graduating from Queen's University in the 80's the doctor took a further degree in London, England, and on his return practised at Wellington and for several years at Picton. He went to Trenton in 1903. At the beginning of the great war the doctor offered his services to the militia, going overseas to Egypt with No. 5 Queen's Hospital Corps in 1915. Later he moved to France with the unit and served in hospital there until the close of hostilities. The late doctor held the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. The deceased had played a prominent part in the municipal affairs of Trenton, being twice elected to the mayoralty. He leaves his widow, one daughter, Miss Marguerite, and two sons, Norman, Trenton, and Dr. George of the Ontario Hospital staff, Kingston.

First Registration.
