London, Sept. 15.—The commentators in the morning newspapers expressed chagrin over the defeat of the British in the first of the international polo matches at Meadowbrook. They were not surprised that the United States won but they were not prepared for such an overwhelming score. The Daily Express declared the defeat together with Lord Winborne's departure for home will break the controversy which has been raging behind the scenes for months.

The sporting public here, it is said, will be concerned less about defeat than by the fact that the British team is in no wise the best available. This is due to a series of unfortunate events which have long hampered the polo enthusiasts and which are alleged to be traceable to personal antagonism. The Daily News truthfully recalls a long series of British failures in international sport of which the Meadowbrook polo and the Walker cup, golf, are only the latest examples. Nevertheless it refuses to believe the British Empire is in danger of moral or physical decay, and hopefully looks for the day when the tables will be turned.

OFFER OF FRANCE. To Found International Institute For Intellectual Co-operation.

Geneva, Sept. 15.—France's generous offer to found an International Institute for intellectual co-operation under the direction of the League of Nations, has been welcomed everywhere, but the question is raised as to the institute's relation with the existing organization already devoting itself to furthering international co-operation. The institution is designed for co-operating with the new organization at Paris by the International Institute of Bibliography and the Union of International Association both of which have their headquarters at Brussels.

TO TRACK CRIMINALS. School of Identification to Open in New York, Sept. 20.

New York, Sept. 15.—A school of criminal identification for fingerprint experts and representatives of police departments of Canada, the United States, Mexico, Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Central American countries, will open at police headquarters here on Sept. 20th. It was announced today. The school grew out of a resolution adopted at the last international police conference, at which police officials from 28 countries were represented. The third vice-president of the school will be S. J. Dickson, chief constable, Toronto.

No Immigration Desired While Men Are Idle

Adelaide, Australia, Sept. 15.—Not until all the unemployed of Australia at present have obtained work is immigration desirable, according to a resolution passed at a labor conference here today.

S. H. J. Cox, a graduate of Cambridge University, has joined the staff of the Brockville Collegiate Institute, to do lower school work. Increased attendance called for a new class. Dr. Arch. Kilgour, formerly of Brockville, in practice at Sparta, Ont., for the last two years, has been appointed to the staff of the Ontario hospital at Penetanguishene.

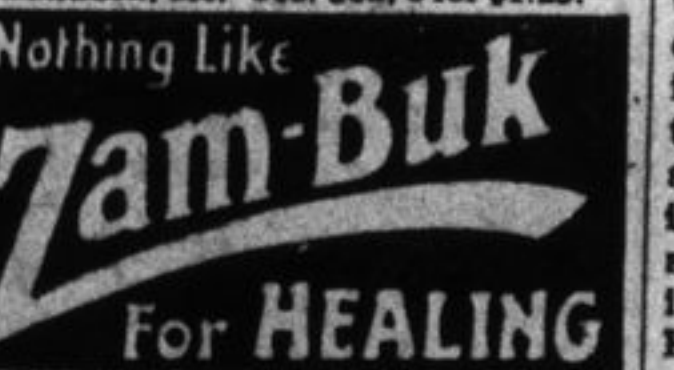
