

What was the result? Production was increased. The resting of mind and body during these three periods, thirty minutes in all, increased production nearly fif-

teen per cent, all round. Where the work was of an individual, or more interesting kind, the production increased about ten per cent., and where the work was mechanical or monotonous, nearly twenty per cent.

My point is that in every kind of work, where it is possible, these short rest periods should be taken. You will not only do more work, but your body and brain will be the better for it, and your general view of life be more optimistic.


