### THE COUNTY SCHOOL CHILDREN AT FAIR

Parade on Friday Afternoon—Excursion From Watertown, N.Y., Arrived on Thursday

It was announced on Thursday morning by A. W. Siffert, local representative of the Agriculture department, that the parade of the county school children would take place in front of the grand stand at the fair grounds on Friday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

The stock judging competition will take place on Friday morning at ten o'clock. The list of those taking part in the stock judging competition was published exclusively in the Whig on Wednesday.

George Pound, one of the ticket sellers at the main gate of the fair grounds, reported that he took in more money on Wednesday than any other day in the history of the fair.

On Thursday morning at 10.30 o'clock, the steamer Brockville arrived from Watertown, N.Y., with a large delegation, who came over for the purpose of seeing the fair. The Watertown City Band accompanied the excursionists and played a delightful programme of music on the market square.
