### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL ON SERIOUS CHARGES

A plea of "not guilty" was entered in each case, and as counsel waived a preliminary hearing, the court committed both for trial. Bail will be granted.

### OBITUARY

Late Mrs. Jacob H. Roblin. There passed to rest last Monday morning, at 95 Nelson street, Kingston, Susanna Roblin, widow of the late Jacob H. Roblin, of Adolphustown. The late Mrs. Roblin, who was seventy-seven years of age, was the descendant of two prominent U. E. L. families; her father being the late Elijah Lucas, of North Fredericksburgh, and her mother, Felinda York. In 1870 she married the late Jacob H. Roblin and lived with him on the farm in the first concession of Adolphustown, where for nearly fifty years she discharged the many duties of farm life. She was ever a good neighbor, a true friend, and above all, a self-denying and conscientious mother. She was for years a regular attendant of the Methodist church and a willing helper in the community. After the death of Mr. Roblin in 1915 Mrs. Roblin made her home with her only daughter, Mrs. A. F. Miller. She had been in failing health for some years, and the end was hastened by a paralytic stroke.

Besides two sisters and a brother, she is survived by two sons, Bryan A., of Belleville, David W., of Kingston, and one daughter, Mrs. A. F. Miller, also of Kingston. A private funeral service will be held Tuesday afternoon at the home of her daughter, after which the remains were interred in the family plot at the U. E. L. Methodist cemetery, Adolphustown.
