Report That "New Blood" Will Be Offered For Civic Honors.

SPLENDID MOTION

"The Man They Could Not Hang" Feature To-day And Wednesday.

"The day of miracles has passed" said people when the gal lows three times failed to John Lee, convicted on circumstantial evidence of the murder Miss Keyes at Abbotskerswell, near Torquay, England. When the second attempt had been made two bags of sand of the same weight as the prisoner were placed on the drop, when it worked successfully. Yet failed to drop when Lee was placed on it immediately afterwards. strange incident resulted in commuting of the death sentence to life imprisonment and Lee twenty-three years at hard labor. Some time after his release a woman on her death-bed confessed to the murder. Lee is still living, happily married to the girl who waited twenty-three years for him.

It should be mentioned that this is the first Australian picture shown in Canada. Lee's story of the crime, now on sale in Kingston bookstores, has been faithfully followed. Though it surrounds murder and a hanging, there nothing gruesome or repulsive in the picture, but there are a touching narrative of parents' devotion, pretty love story of a boyhood sweetheart whose faith in Lee neve wavered, touches of humor here and there, all set in the midst of beauti ful land and ocean scenery.

The picture is much aided Miss Doreen Thompson, who sings vocal items in connection with th picture, and by W. Leonard-Howe who describes the incidents on the screen. Other items contributing to a good evening's entertainment clude full orchestral accompaniment, two other reels and singing and dancing numbers.
