"THE LOVE TEST"
 In packing theatres wherever it has been shown, "The Love Test," America's sweetheart comedy-drama success to be presented at the Grand for three nights commencing Thursday, Sept. 25th, has demonstrated that the public is incurably religious and that it is only necessary to get down to where individual religion resides and "mix laughter with the sterner stuff," to evoke its expression. WORLD'S EIGHTH WONDER.
