GERMANY SEEKS TO ENTER LEAGUE AS A FULL EQUAL

Statement Issued By President Ebert Who Says Germany's Collaboration Could Only Be That Of a Great Power on Equal Footing.

Berlin, Sept. 24.—Germany will in the near future make an effort to enter the League of Nations on an equal footing with the great powers, it was officially announced yesterday afternoon in a communique issued at the close of a cabinet meeting.

President Ebert presided at the meeting, after which the following communique was issued: "The question of Germany's entry into the League of Nations was thoroughly discussed, and it was unanimously agreed that the efforts of the German Government should be directed towards Germany's entrance into the League in the near future."

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR OPENS PICTON FAIR; HISTORICAL PAGEANT ONE OF THE FEATURES

More Exhibits Than Ever Before—R.O.H.A. Band of Kingston Taking Part—An Old Log Cabin is a Unique Exhibit.

(By White Staff Reporter) Picton, Sept. 24.—Picton Fair, which promises to exceed all previous records, got away to a splendid start on Tuesday afternoon when it was officially opened by Lieut.-Governor Henry Cockshutt.

The school children of the town and county paraded to the grounds at one-thirty o'clock led by the band of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery of Kingston. Upon arrival at the show ground, the children were formed up in front of the Grand Stand.

A Unique Exhibit.

One of the places well worth visiting at the show is the old log cabin which was recently purchased from Hale Kingsley, taken to the show grounds and turned into an "Old Curiosity Shop."

More Exhibits Than Ever.

The number of exhibits this year is larger than last, and it was stated by those who are in a position to know that they are a great deal better. The poultry exhibit consists of about six hundred birds, including all kinds of chickens, fowl, bantams, and water-fowl.

The main building, where many merchants are showing their wares, is very fine. One of the exhibits which caught the eye of many, was the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, which was under the direction of a local committee of which Mrs. F. H. Minaker was in charge.
