**LITERARY HISTORY DEMAND.**

George Macaulay Trevelyan in the October Yale Review.

There is a public demand for historical literature, for the interpretation of the results of historical research thrown into a literary form. The public has not the time to read mere collections of facts and interpret them for itself. Some people, indeed, still declare that the function of the historian is to throw the facts at the head of the public and leave people to make their own interpretation. But it does not work. The public, even that part of it which we call the serious reading public, has not the time to make its own interpretation of undigested masses of fact. Readers pass by on the other side. But they turn to books like Mr. Wells' "Outline of History" and Mr. Strachey's essays. Mr. Strachey is not a man of deep historical learning, but he is a man of letters of the first order, and so there is a large public that "wants" whatever he has to say about history. He is doing history a great service by connecting her again with literature and by interesting the public in her themes.

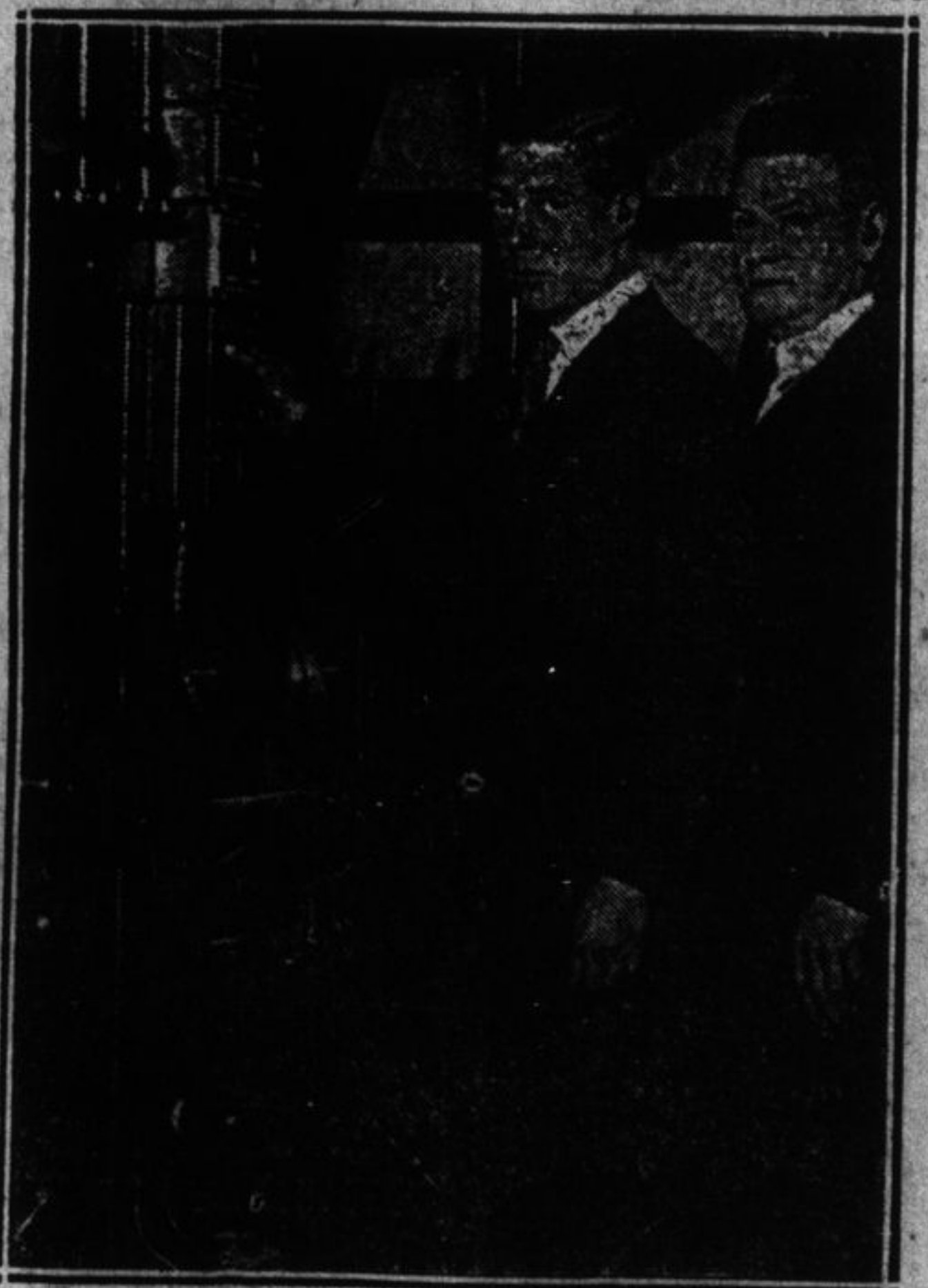
