After a continuous service of ten years as Reeve of Portmouth, James Halliday is retiring at the end of this year. In addition to this long term as reeve, Mr. Halliday also served in the council a few years. During the years he has been connected with the council he has rendered able service and has been untiring in his efforts to promote the interests of the community. His friends do not want him to retire, but Mr. Halliday feels that the time has come for him to step aside and give others a chance to take over the work. Not only in the Portmouth council has Mr. Halliday given able services but also in the Frontenac county council. He has served as warden of the county for one year.

A number of Mr. Halliday's friends have asked him to serve in the city council or on the public utilities commission, and although he has not yet given his decision, he may accede to the wishes of his friends, and allow his name to go before the electors as a candidate for the commission. With his practical knowledge in the electrical business, he would be a valuable addition to that body.

Mr. Halliday has been in the electrical business for upwards of thirty years. He made his start in the electric plant at Gananoque, owned by J. M. Campbell. After serving with Mr. Campbell for some years, he took a position with the Kingston Light, Heat and Power Company, and later on was connected with the Kingston street railway company, and for six years was electrical superintendent of this company. He left the railway company to go into the electrical business himself.
