The Late Abigail Wilder. Abigail Reynolds, wife of the late Rufus Wilder, passed away at her late residence, Washburn street, Picton, at the ripe old age of eighty-one years. Mrs. Wilder was the daughter of Cicero Reynolds and Elizabeth Clarke, and the granddaughter of Daniel Reynolds, the first white settler at Wellington and a United Empire Loyalist. He erected the first house east of the Methodist church. The stone was collected from the beach by Indians. Until in the nineteenth century this house was owned by his descendants. Mrs. Wilder leaves six daughters to mourn her loss.

A Splendid Christian Woman. The Napane Beaver records the death of Mrs. Grace Raworth Cedar Vale, at the age of ninety-two years, three months and seven days. She was a splendid Christian woman. Her husband passed away in 1880. In the fall of the same year her home was burned and she went to live with her sister, Mrs. Sidney Huffman, and after her death she went to her brother's at Hay Bay for a while, and then to Bowmanville. She resided with Mrs. L. Mason, Sr., for nineteen years. She also lived with Mrs. W. Cryderman and Mrs. W. M. Noble, all of whom gave cheerful testimony to her amiable disposition and consistent character. In 1917 she went to live with her niece, Mrs. James Carroll, Tamworth, where she remained until her death. Eight weeks before her death she fell and broke her hip and was confined to her bed until death relieved her. At times she suffered terribly, but bore it all with Christian patience. Never was she heard to murmur. She was buried beside her husband, at Bath.
