CROSS CHANNEL RECORD. French Paris-to-London Plane Averaged 138 Miles an Hour. London, Sept. 27.—A French airplane carrying ten passengers with their baggage and French mail flew from Paris to London yesterday in one hour and forty-seven minutes. The distance is 245 miles, and the average speed of the machine was thus little more than 138 miles an hour, which was stated to be a record for a heavy commercial airplane fully loaded. The time usually occupied on this aerial journey in similar circumstances is about two hours and a half.

The airplane which made this record was a Bleriot machine belonging to the French Air Union, fitted with four separate Hispano-Suiza engines of 130 horse power. It was calculated that the total weight of the load carried on the flight was a ton and a half. Owing to the miscalculation due to the fact that summer time is still in operation in France, though not in this country, it was at first erroneously reported that the flight had been made in only 47 minutes, and therefore at an average speed of more than 312 miles an hour.

Montreal firm, under a good domestic demand; jobbing specials, 48 to 49c; extras, 42 to 43c; firsts, 36 to 37c; seconds, 30c. Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta markets remain firm and unchanged. Vancouver firm, jobbing extras, 57c; firsts, 55c; seconds and pullets, 42c. St. John, N.B., receipts slow, demand fair. Prices ruling at country points; extras, 40c; firsts, 35c; seconds, 28c; retailing extras, 50c; firsts, 45c; seconds, 40c. Charlottetown, P.E.I., receipts falling off, consumptive demands for all grades good, paying country points extras, 32c; firsts, 27c; seconds, 22c; retailing extras, 38c; firsts, 30c; seconds, 25c.
