

Then Moses is shown on the Mount of Sinai, his soul in communion with the Creator and every detail of the gift of the tables of stone with the commandments engraved shown minutely. The Great Prophet then descends to find his followed worshipping the golden calf. The latter is destroyed and, dismayed by the anger of their leader, the Israelites repent.

Then the story is carried into modern days. A widow, a good and upright woman, sits reading the Bible to her two sons. One of them scoffs at the Commandments, at God and at religion. His mother demands repentance or his absence from the house and he chooses the latter course. The other son upholds the Truth and remains steadfast. He who had gone finds a girl in queer circumstances. She is starving and runs off with his lunch, seeking protection in the shop of the son who remained steadfast. The mother protects her and the son who had scoffed remained at home for a time. Both boys fell in love with the newcomer but the scoffer won her and also took her to his views. married and set out to become suc-

cessful with holiness. One by one the erring son broke the commandments of God. He became a great contractor and throve. But his sins soon found him out. As his aged mother wandered into a church he had built to admire it the poor mortar and materials he had used gave way and one end of it crumbled in to injure her fatally. He finally finished by being brought to his ruination through the murder of a woman he had imported for his own pleasure by smuggling, dying
