The players still in the running are Messrs. A. M. Stroud, J. C. Reynolds, W. P. Cusick, D. Chowa and McKenzie.

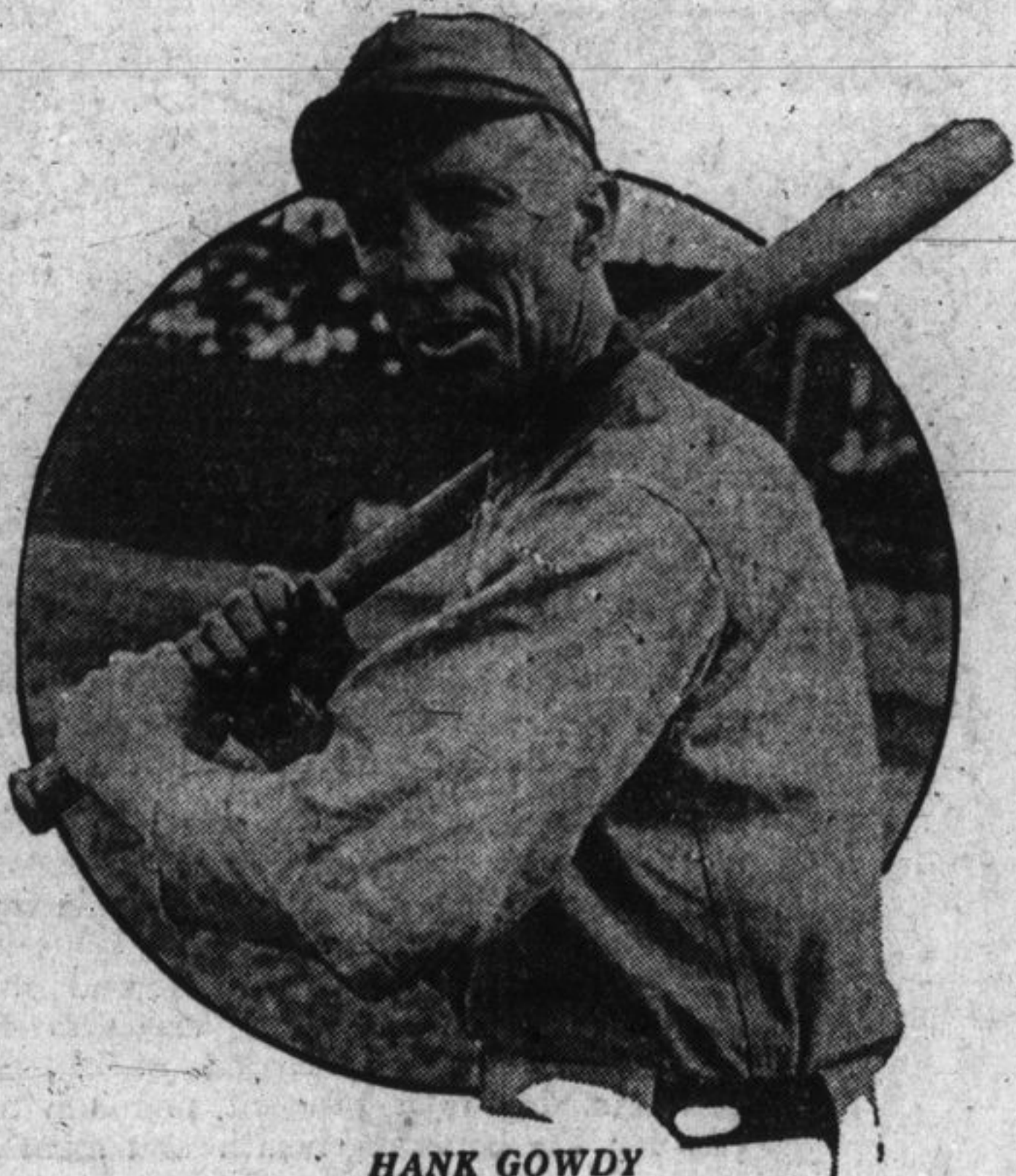
INDOOR BASEBALL.

Hussars have been runners-up in the indoor ball two years hand-running and are out after a championship this winter.

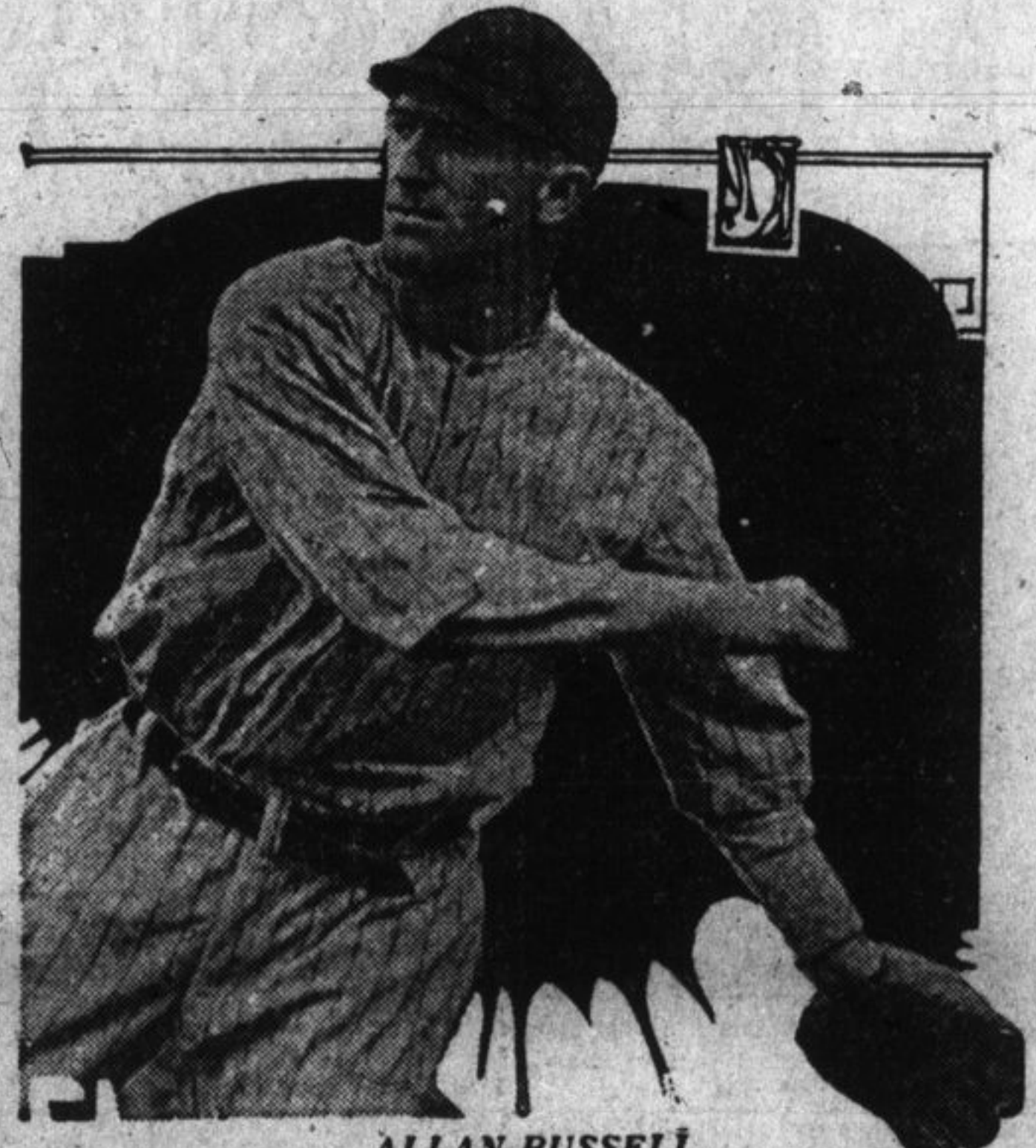
Price Adjusted.

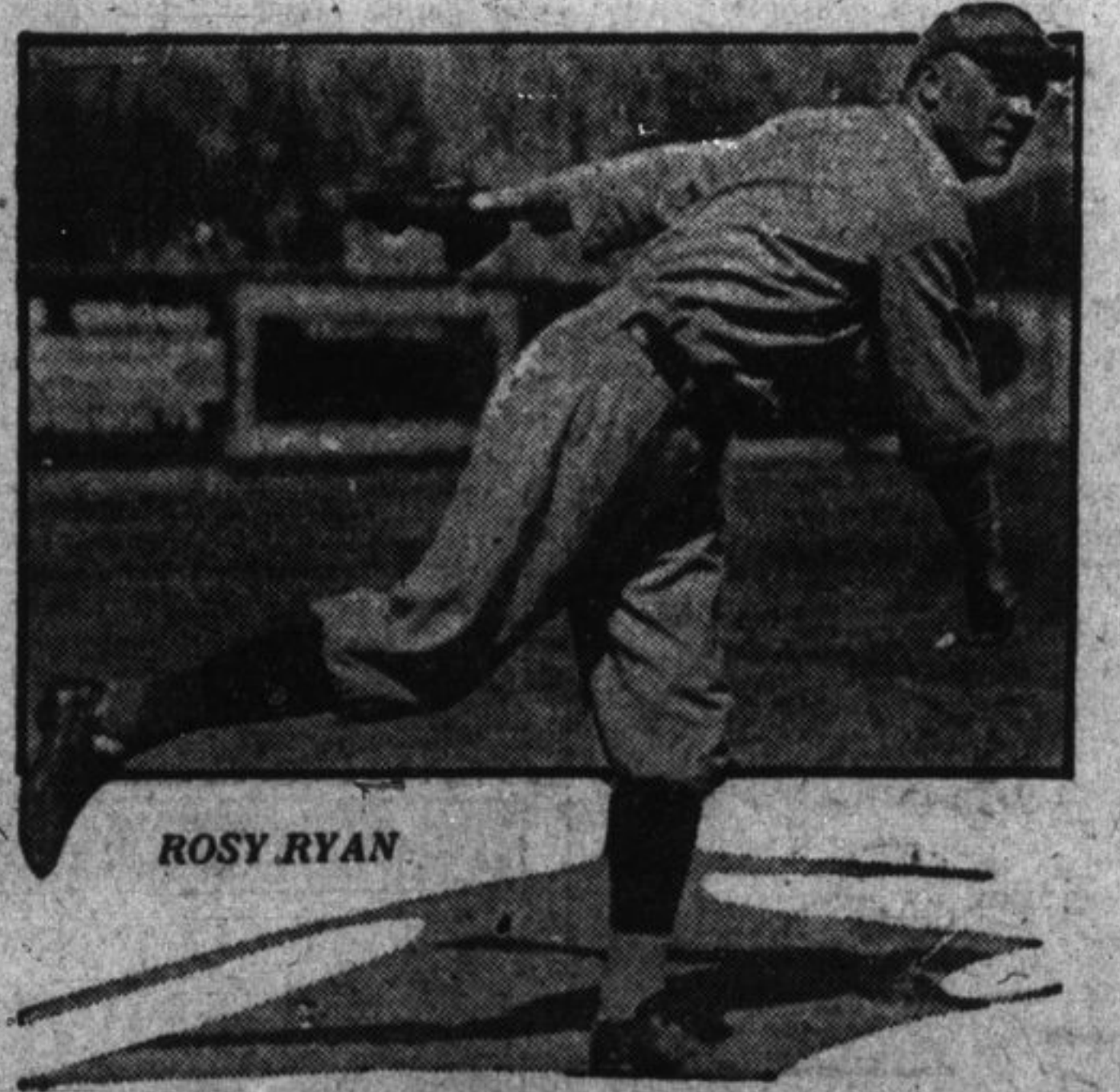
HANK GOWDY

Veteran catcher who has already taken all the games behind the bat for Giants in the present world series.



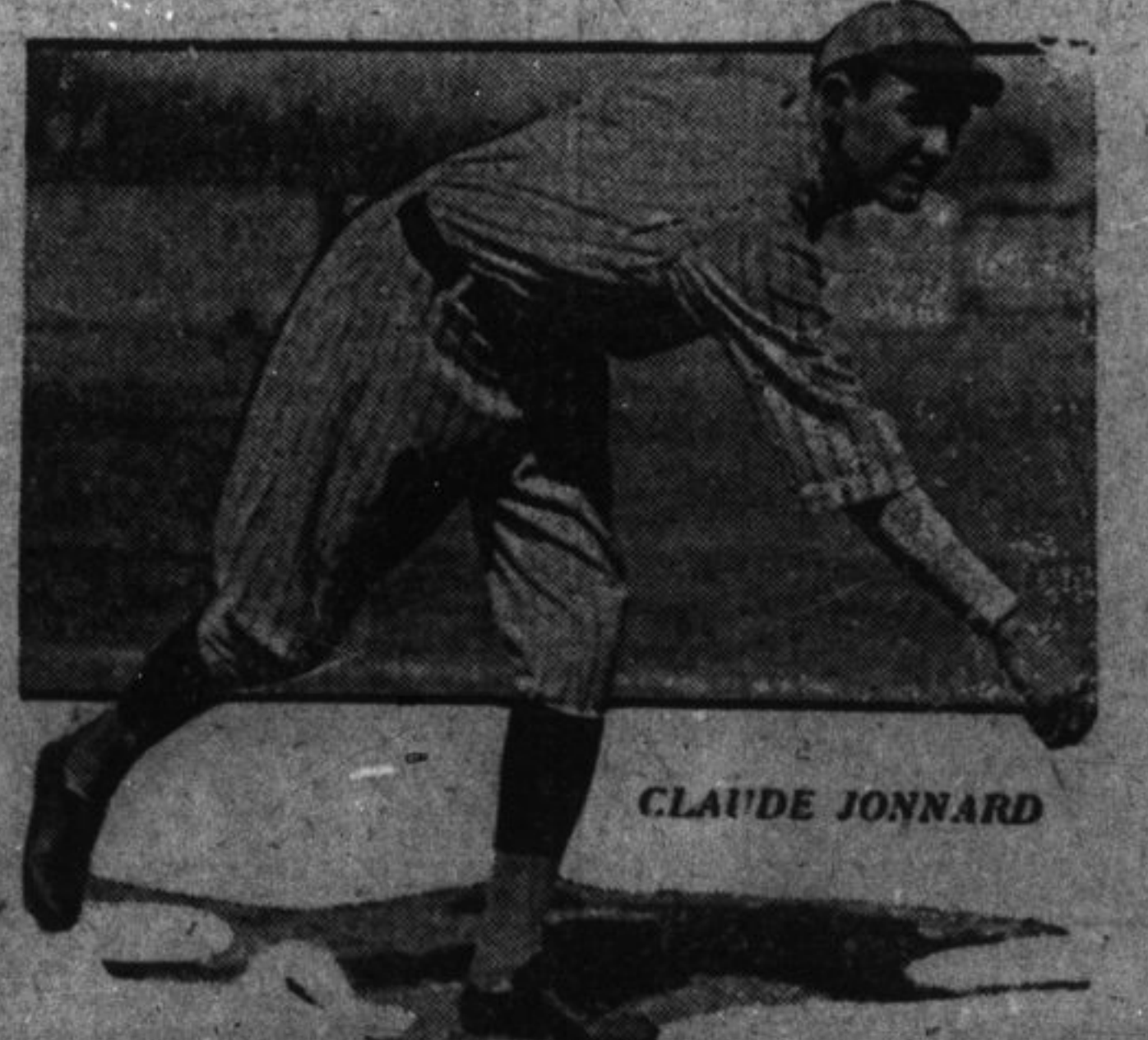
ALLAN RUSSELL

KIWANIS GIVE AID TO BATTLING TEAM

Voted \$50 to Aid 4th Hussars in Finals—List Open at Whig.

The 4th Hussars baseball club, with the championship of eastern Ontario tucked safely away, is waiting anxiously for news as to the next move. Goderich and Bridgeburg have another game to go in the western finals and as "Bunny" Spencer put it—"We'll be playing with snowshoes if they don't hurry up." The financial difficulties of the Hussars need little explanation. The statement of one series was published in these columns and it was enough to convince the fans of the need for assistance.

At yesterday's meeting of the Kiwanis club the subject of aiding the Hussars was brought up by President W. Y. Mills and on motion of Messrs. H. C. Nickle and B. N. Steacy fifty dollars was voted to aid the baseball club. Both the mover and seconder of the motion spoke emphatically in favor of it, and all the Kiwanis seemed to favor it. That will be a big help as a starter.

LET BIG FOUR ASSIST.

By Making Grant From Its Surplus to the Hussars.

Hotel Dieu Hospital, Oct. 6.—(To the Sporting Editor): I notice that an appeal is being made for funds for the 4th Hussars in their race for the intermediate championship of the O.B.A.A., and that the suggestion has been made that the city council should make a grant to the intermediate organization as was done for the Big Four team when it started out two years ago.

That the 4th Hussars needs the money no one will doubt, every sportsman in the city will agree that they deserve it, and I will be very glad to see that the players be given the support that they need.

I would like to suggest that this is an admirable time for the executive of the Big Four to step into the breach and make a donation from its surplus of two years ago, part of which is made up of the civic grant of \$500, of which mention has been made. Assistance from the Big Four would undoubtedly be welcomed by the Hussars, it would be in line with promotion of sport, and it will be developing the feeding ground for the Big Four, for from the City League must come the players for the ranks of the senior team. Further, it will meet the wishes of the fans who contribute to the gates of the seniors to see a portion of the surplus devoted to assisting the City League.

It will not do to argue that there is no surplus for there is one, it being a well known fact that the Big Four team finished the 1923 season with a tidy sum ahead, and the season which has just closed was productive of generous support from the fans which must have added to the surplus of two years ago.

I might remark that when I suggested last spring that the Big Four executive should make a grant to the Circle-Six Hockey team to aid it in its memorable trip to Toronto the argument was advanced that the funds in hand were for baseball.

PIGSKIN PRIMER

What is a flying or diving tackle?

When a player leaves his feet and throws his body through the air to tackle an opponent with the ball it is called a flying tackle.
