FOLIAGE ON TREES DIMMER ON LIGHTS

Great Need of Tree Trimming in Various Sections of the City.

That there is great need for some tree trimming in various parts the city and that the foliage on trees in many sections is a grea drawback to the lights now in use was the opinion expressed at a meeting of the civic fire and light com mittee held on Tuesday afternoon, while the question of more street lights was under discussion.

The committee is not at all anx ious to saddle the city with any extra expense this year, for street lights, but it is agreed that there are a few places where it is absolutely necessary to give some attention. However, no action was taken pending another report which wil

be submitted at the next meeting. On motion of Ald. William Holder, it was decided to have the light on Alma street, between Balaciava and Ordnance streets, increased from a 100-candle power to a 600 candle power. The utilities commission will be asked to make this change.

Ald. O'Connor stated that Dufferin street was in need of more light. The trees needed trimming to give the lights a chance.

Chief Armstrong remarked there was need of tree trimming. all over the city.

Chairman Chown suggested that the committee not go in for any extra expense for lighting this year. Ald. O'Connor said that he would favor expending the sum of \$1,000 on new lights if it was necessary. Accidents might occur as a result of the darkness, and he felt that if the citizens wanted the lights they should be provided.

A request for an increase in sa ary was received from Hugh Pollie, motor mechanic on the fire depart. ment. Mr. Pollie has the care of the motor apparatus and also the training of the drivers. He has been receiving \$3.275 per day and it was decided to increase his salary to \$3.60 per day. Chief Armstrong recommended this increase.

The chairman, Ald, Chown, presided at the meeting and the other members present were Mayor Angrove, Ald. O'Connor and Ald. William Holder.


