**WESTPORT MEMORIALS TO FALLEN HEROES**

Unveiled on Wednesday by Canon J. W. Jones—Address by Gen. A. E. Ross.

On Wednesday, a beautiful October day, the inhabitants of Westport and the surrounding country for miles, gathered to do honor to the noble heroes who fell in the late war. Over one hundred boys left Westport, enlisting under Lieut.-Col. Andrew Gray, M.P.P., and others, but some eleven paid the supreme sacrifice in Flanders Fields. It was to commemorate their valiant fight and glorious death that the Women's Institute put in concrete form the desire of the entire community of a war memorial, which took the form of a magnificent stone gateway to the athletic grounds of that village. At the right of the gateway there is a brass tablet setting forth the particulars of the war and the local heroes who died.

After a sumptuous dinner served by the ladies the ceremonies commenced at 2 p.m., under the leadership of Col. Gray. The Patriotic hymn rendered, "O God Our Help In Ages Past," Canon J. W. Jones, chaplain of the 47th Battalion, with appropriate prayers, dedicated the memorial, the last post was sounded and General A. E. Ross, M.P., Kingston, unveiled the tablet, when some eleven school children, relatives of the illustrious dead, laid wreaths beside it.

General Ross, in an eloquent address, comforted the mourners and urged all to stand fast by the freedom preserved.

The hymn "Safe In the Arms of Jesus," followed, and the whole concourse of people retired to the athletic grounds, where appropriate speeches of a high order were delivered by Rev. Father O'Rourke, Horton, Fraser, Strange, Canon Jones, Mr. Stewart, M.P., Brockville, and McGlade.
