## MISSION CONDITIONS.

In British Columbia Described By J. M. Miller.

St. Andrews Young Women's Auxiliary was addressed by Mr. J. M. Miller of Queen's University, who spent the summer in the mission field at Gootah Lake, B.C.

Some of the acute facts of home mission work were given, and in his introductory remarks he told of the immense distance in northern British Columbia where settlers in many cases live ten miles from any road. Considering the unbounded hospitality of the people, Mr. Miller stated that really no hardship was endured on the part of mission workers.

The subject chosen was "Conditions as Our Church Sees It in Northern British Columbia," where in Mr. Miller pictured a four-hundred mile circle in which only five Presbyterian churches are to be found. In southern British Columbia churches are very scarce, but in the north it is ten times worse. A most interesting comparison was drawn between the presbytery of Kingston and one in British Columbia, giving a fair idea of the tremendous field covered by so few workers. High tribute was paid to Mr. North and Mr. McCrimmon, (whose resignations have from necessity been accepted) for their successful work and endless effort. Mention was also made of Mr. Ashford, who has had such wonderful success with his church at McBride. It is the kind of work no man can stand long. Three or four years are all, as a rule, that his health will permit, and then he is forced to seek other fields where the work is less arduous.

Great stress was laid on the life of the women in the north country, which is usually termed "Man's Country." It is a very hard place for women to live in, there being a great tendency to carelessness in daily living and an indifference and antagonism to religion. And there is the same disregard of religion in the women as in the men. The great thing is to have the young girls by means of school homes. Great credit was given to the school in Prince George and Lake Francis hospital. The only chance for the girls is the school home.

In conclusion Mr. Miller stated the task of those at home is to take religion to these people, building more churches, and showing the people what religion is. His hearers were urged not to take any chances in the very near future on government control.

## World Development Of the Telephone

In the development of telephones and telegraphs, according to the latest statistics on world conditions in these important industries compiled by the statistical department of the Bell system, Canada occupies a very creditable position. Only the United States, of all the nations of the earth, exceeds this Dominion in the number of telephones per hundred of population, and next to us comes Denmark and then far-off New Zealand. The figures for the leaders in telephone development are:

United States 13.1 telephones per hundred inhabitants; Canada 10.4; Denmark 3.3; New Zealand 3.1; Sweden 6.6; Norway 5.8; Australia 4.6; Switzerland 4.3; Germany 3.5; Netherlands 2.6; Great Britain 2.3.

In the matter of miles of telephone wire in use per hundred inhabitants, our position is even more favorable—aided no doubt by the great distances our western telephone systems must traverse. The figures here are:

Canada 28.5 miles per hundred inhabitants; New Zealand, 19.5; Denmark, 19 miles; Sweden, 14.2; United States, 33.9.

Among fifty of the world's largest cities, as of January 1st, 1923, Toronto stood ninth in point of telephone development, being credited with 19.2 telephones per hundred inhabitants. In this list Omaha, Neb., with 28 is given first place. Ottawa with 18.5 telephones would be well up, but is apparently too small in population to be included in this particular list. Montreal with 19.4 telephones per hundred of population is in the fifteenth place.

Of the eight important nations from which the returns for the fiscal year 1922 are quoted, Canada is the lowest in point of earnings per telephone. The national currencies of the various countries have here been converted into United States currency at average rates of exchange for that year. The figures are: Australia, \$45.13; Canada, \$42.85; Great Britain and Northern Ireland, \$31.40; Japan, \$49.65; Netherlands, \$50.33; Sweden, \$51.19; Switzerland, \$51.32; United States, \$48.23. It would seem a fair inference here that on the average throughout the Dominion, the amount paid by telephone users for the service furnished them is not unreasonable when compared with other lands.

The figures show that in communities of less than one hundred thousand population, which would embrace the rural sections, Canada's telephone development is 3.9 'phones per hundred inhabitants. The next lowest under this head is New Zealand with 7.1; Denmark, 6.5; Norway, 5.1. The United States heads this list with 11.1 'phones per hundred.


