A PEPPY PICTURE IS "SINNERS IN SILK"
 Heralded as the best picture yet of the jazz series, "Sinners in Silk" comes to the Capitol Theatre on Thursday for a run of three days. It tells not only of youthful revelers growing older, but of elderly fellows growing younger, and is said to contain some of the peppiest and most interesting scenes yet made of life in the younger smart set. The elderly group which enters the life of today is represented in the picture by Adolphe Menjou, who plays the role of a gentleman of uncertain years who takes the Steinhilber rejuvenation treatment and jumps with a bang into the high-powered activities of younger society. Eleanor Boardman plays the role of a girl who is attracted in spite of herself to this old-young charmer, Conrad Nagel is the young man who really loves her. One of the features of this picture is a bevy of beautiful girls who appear as the different types of New York's smart set.

"BULLDOG DRUMMOND" GOES OVER BIG IN CAPITAL
 Speaking of Percy Hutchison's presentation of "Bulldog Drummond," which comes to the Grand Opera House Friday and Saturday of this week, the Ottawa Journal says:
 Mr. Percy Hutchison's company carried "Bulldog Drummond" through four rapid fire acts before a full house in the Russell Theatre last evening when their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Byng were present.

The play was based on the novel of the same name by "Sapper." It employed all the devices that have fixed melodrama in the hearts of theatre goers. As a mystery play it belongs with "The Bat," "The Cat and the Canary," and the Grand Guignol plays of France. The elements of good modern melodrama were all there and were used to the best advantage. There were straight jackets, mysterious doors, drugs, guns, villains and a villainess, groans off stage, and a dumb Chinese servant.

The play moved slowly through the first two scenes, gathering momentum and complexity, and arriving at a climax in the fourth scene. Mr. Percy Hutchison, as Capt. Hugh Drummond, and Mr. H. Saxon-Snell, the sinister impostor physician, staged a realistic fight. It was one of the high spots in the play. For several minutes they maintained a running fight with gun play, knives and high dives.

Six sets were used, all effectively staged. The interior for the second act was particularly good.
 Mr. Percy Hutchison has an English company with a long record of successful production in the old country and throughout the empire. Mr. Hutchison played the leading part, and kept his audience at high pitch throughout. He has associated with him an excellent cast, fifteen strong, each member of which entered completely into the spirit of the play.

As the suave, sardonic torturer, Mr. Saxon-Snell gave a most satisfactory performance. Mr. Frank Lacy shared the honors of villainy with him, and did a striking bit of impersonation within the play. Miss Betty Nelson made a delightful English heroine, and Miss Kate Carey, in her role of villainess, was very strong. The cast included Lord Lyveden, as Denny the servant of Capt. Drummond, who prefers the stage to politics. Mr. Fred Forrest, who has been here before, was excellent as Silas Hocking, the American detective.
