REFUSED PRISONER AT PENITENTIARY

A Man Intending to Appeal His Case Must Be Kept in Jail.

Thomas Fox, London, Ont., who was sentenced to fourteen years in the Portsmouth penitentiary, and also to receive twenty lashes during that time, arrived at the prison on Monday afternoon but was not admitted and was taken back to the county jail at London.

At the last session of the dominion parliament, the Penitentiary Act was amended that in case of a man who is sentenced to the prison and intends to appeal his case, he must be retained in the county jail in the city or town from which he is sentenced until such time as his case is finally settled by the court.

On Monday when Fox arrived at the prison, Warden Penford asked him if he intended to appeal his case, and when he stated that he did, the constable in charge was instructed to take him back to London.

This new act is working out very satisfactorily. In years past, a man would probably be sentenced to a period of two or three years, and then he would appeal his case. When the appeal is heard, the court may decide to reduce the sentence and instead of serving it in the penitentiary, the prisoner is transferred to the Burwash farm or the Central prison at Guelph.

To the Business Men of Kingston, Kingston, Oct. 21. (To the Editor.)—As a business man and employer, kindly allow me to present a few facts on prohibition.

Mr. Roger Babson, the greatest statistician of business on this continent, recently said that it would be a great misfortune to Ontario, if she should repeal her Temperance Act.

Capital invested in almost any business commodity will employ more men and pay more men than in liquor.

The retail grocers of Vancouver petitioned the government to submit to the people a vote on bone-dry prohibition.

Let us make a few comparisons between Montreal and Toronto. During the last three years the bank clearings of Montreal dropped seven billion dollars to five and one half billion.

The adult death rate of Montreal is 15.6 per thousand, that of Toronto 11.4. The death rate of children under twelve months old in Montreal is 148 per thousand, that of Toronto 63.
