**AT QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY**

"The greatest migration since Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt" is the way Miss Knight, speaking on the "Save the Children Fund" in Convocation Hall Tuesday night, described the recent transfer into Greece of the Greek Christians in Turkey. It had inundated the peninsula with thousands of refugees, many of them with only the clothes on their backs. One in five of the country's four or five millions is a refugee. Athens and Sa-

lonika are full of sad forms of humanity living in most wretched conditions, said Miss Knight, who visited those cities this summer. To relieve some of this distress is the object of the above fund, which supplies food to some of the starving children. Canada is a leading contributor to the fund. A Queen's graduate, Dr. W. Kennedy, is its administrator in the Near East. Twelve dollars will keep a child for a year. At the close of the address Prof. Reid MacCallum, who presided, announced that a subscription list would be opened at Queen's in charge of one of the students. The Arts Society, when it met Tuesday afternoon, began arrangements for the annual Arts Dinner and dance the latter part of January.

The Levana Debating Club, when it met Tuesday evening, heard an interesting address by Dr. W. E. McNeill on "How to Arrange an Argument." The club has received word that the Varsity girls have decided to enter the girls' intercollegiate debating union with Queen's and McGill. The debates may take place Nov. 22nd.

"You can't get up that way—come on down."  
And the party came down amiably and without a word. As the prince passed J. B. Foote, who was also in the office, he lifted his hand in salute. But it was not till he had shown them to the elevator that "Dad" Orate became conscious that he was ordering about the future King of England.

"Good morning," said the prince to him affably from the inside of the elevator.  
And "Dad's" eyes opened wider than they had been since he was an infant and his hand went to his head in almost military fashion.  
"Good morning, your Royal Highness," he returned—astounded.

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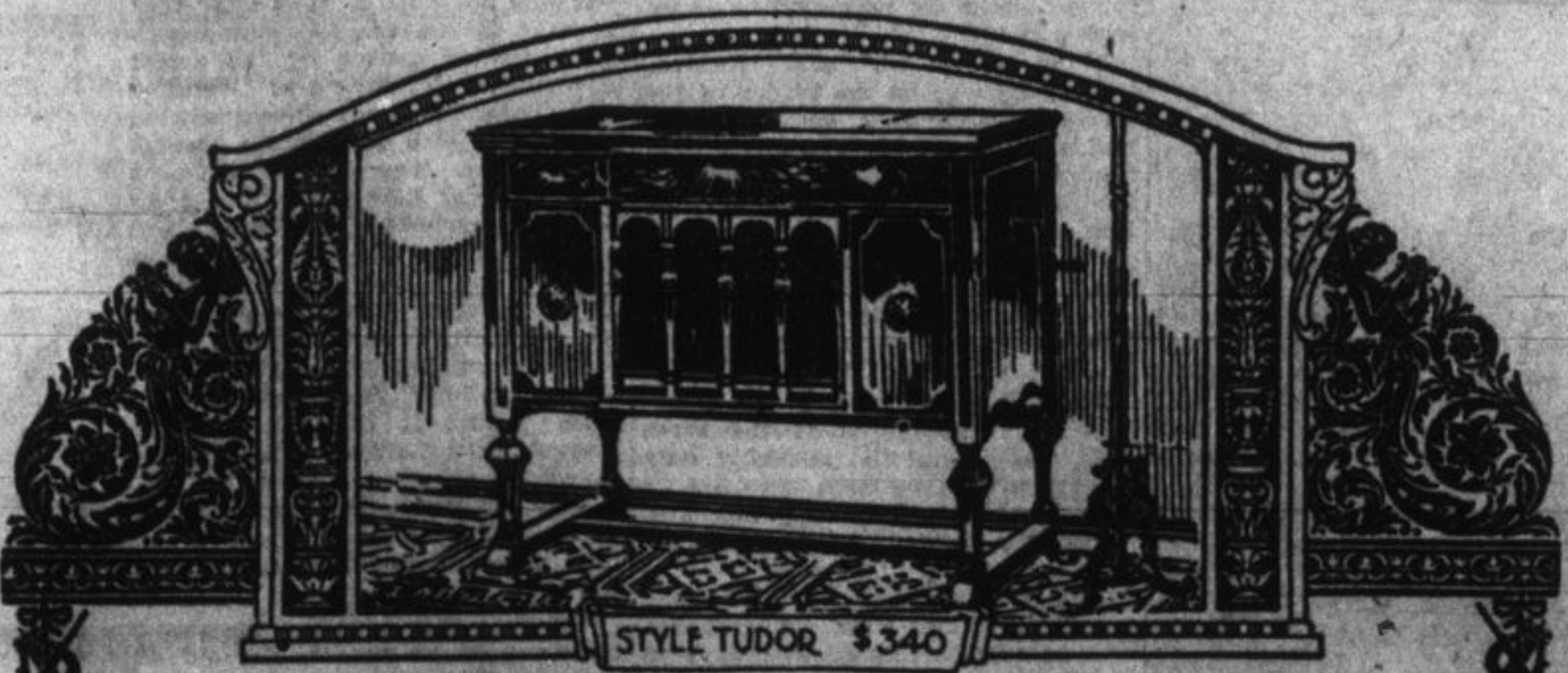
