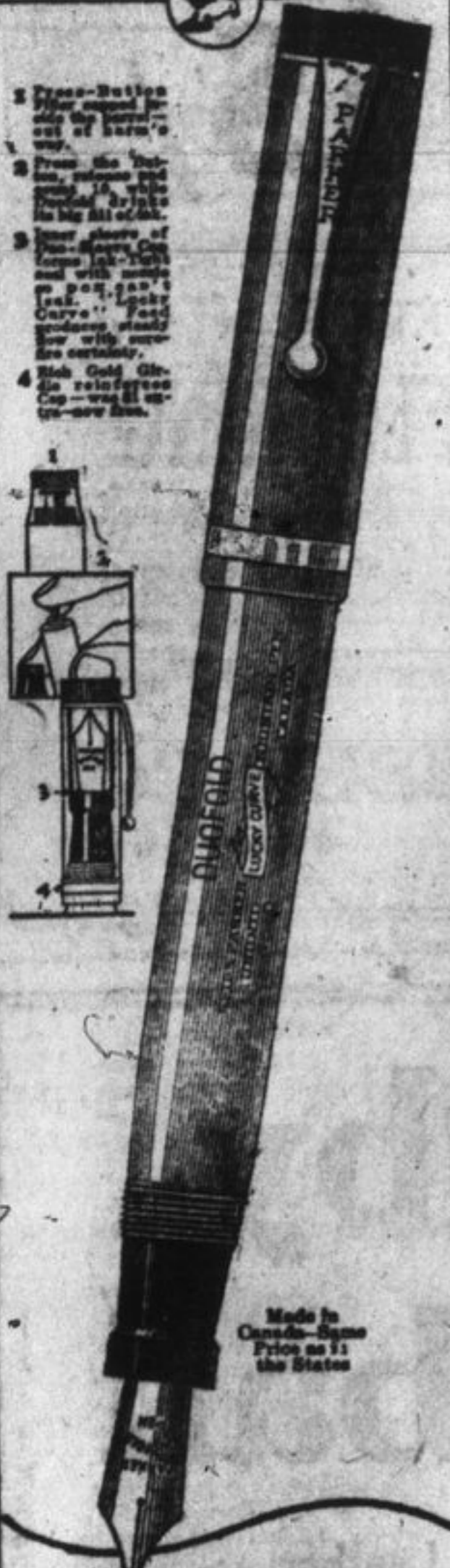

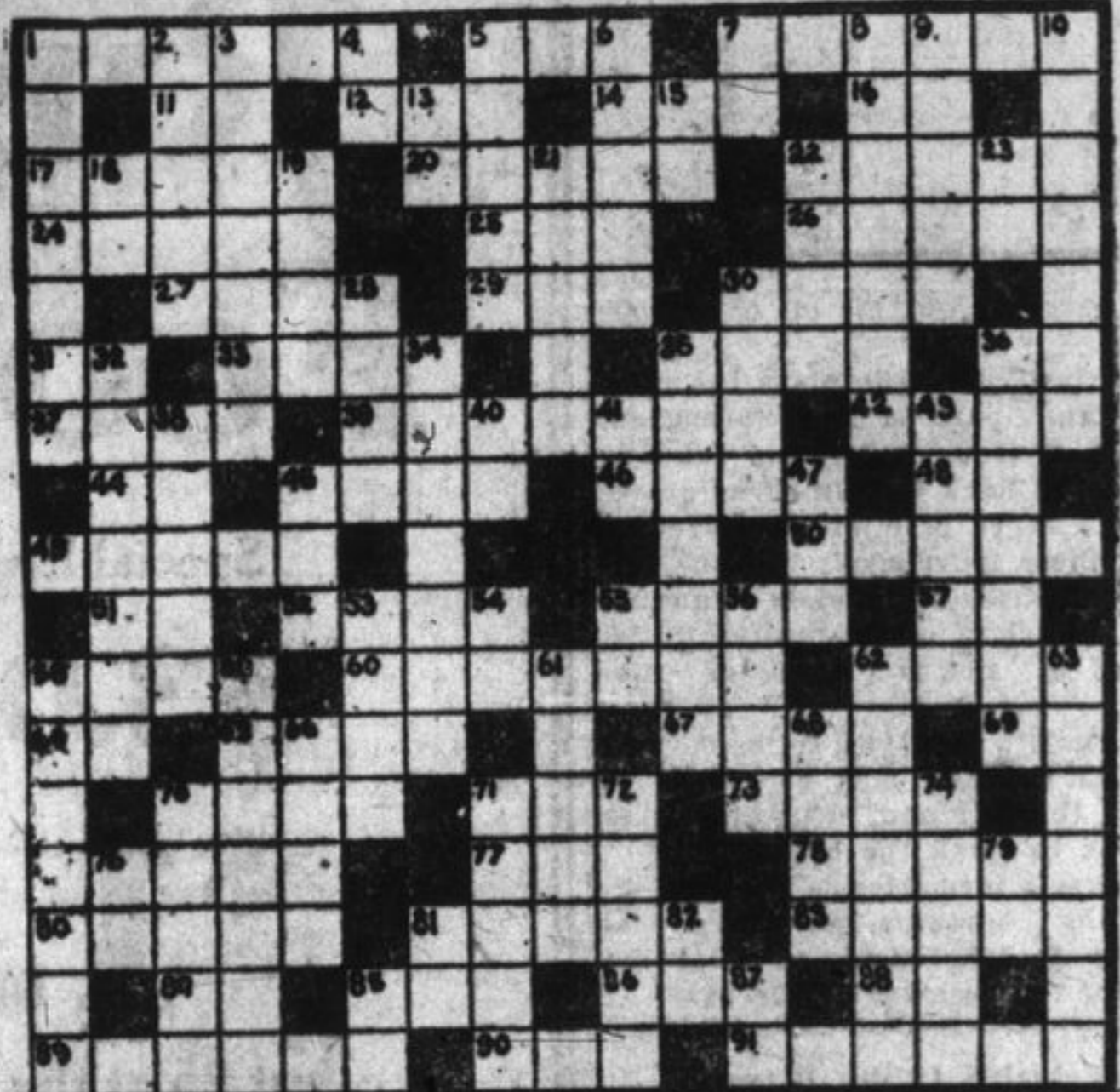

Booze will Vote to a Man - Fight it With Your Ballots

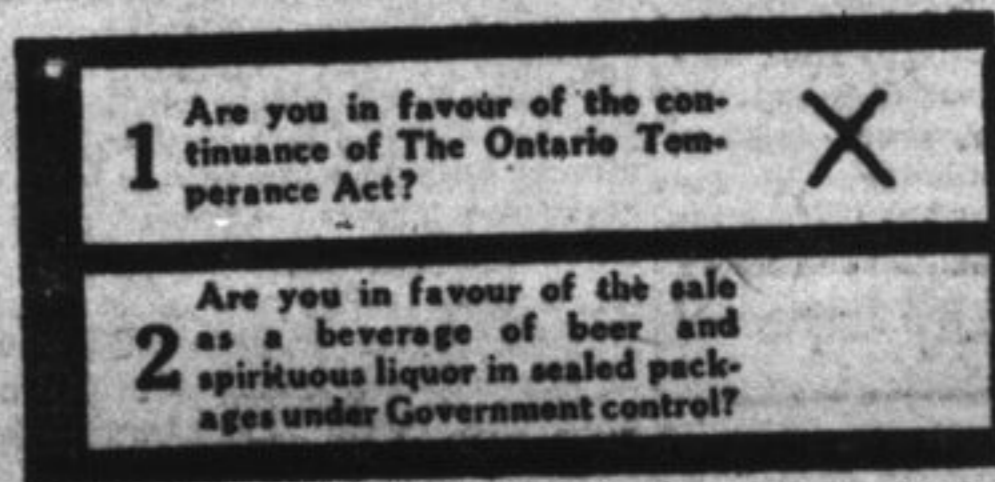
Every citizen who desires the best for the Province and who believes even a little bit in the O.T.A. is urged to get out on October 23rd and

LETTERS To The Editor

Gives Advice To Ontario. Atholstan, Que., Oct. 21.-(To the Editor): Having just returned from a trip through Brockville, Kingston, Napanee and my old home in Ontario, I would be pleased to be granted a little space in your valuable paper to state some facts concerning some propositions put to me relative to the plebiscite now at hand.

A few I had conversation with were in favor of government control and were led to believe if there was government control in Ontario it would do away with all bootlegging, rum-running, illicit stills, etc. Also that under the present O.T.A. there is so much drinking of home brew booze and harmful drugs causing serious results, and that under government control anyone could get good liquor from government stores and be safe in drinking it.

Here is my answer: I have lived in Quebec just one mile from the inter-

national boundary line for one year and five months, where we have what is known as government control, and if ever there was or is a place where bootlegging and rum-running thrives it is here. I see car loads and truck loads of booze passing almost every day and night, being handled by almost all classes of men and even women. The great lure of profit derived from it has induced many even moral men into the business. I have eight miles to drive to one of my appointments and I am informed that there are at the present time no less than nine (not government stores) but common farm homes along the



way where booze is sold. The government may control the first sale and get the revenue, but it does not control the last sale. I have seen it sold and handed, bottle after bottle, from one car to another, almost in front of my own house.

With regard to the quality of liquor handled, I had the privilege of seeing a bottle of what was supposed to be beer. It had no label and when held to the light looked like some muddy water dipped from a swamp hole. When this is under government control, I am afraid even the quality will not be much improved. Drug Traffic Increases Under Prohibition.

WHY THE WEATHER?

DR. CHARLES F. BROOKS Secretary, American Meteorological Society, Tells How.

Travels of Air. Few people realize how extensively air travels. In a few days a large mass of air from the Gulf of Mexico may move across the United States and into Canada, or a suddenly arriving northwest gale from the Canadian wilds may carry a cold wave far into the United States, sometimes to the Gulf coast. Smoke or dust carried in winds from known sources serve to show the routes and extent of these air migrations.



THE AIR CIRCUS' FIRST CASUALTY

Here is the first casualty of the Dayton (Ohio) air circus. This plane, carrying seven persons, started out from Chicago—but never even got on its way. It crashed into onion crates piled at one end of the take-off field before it scarcely was off the ground. The passengers were six schoolboys who had won trips to Dayton on the strength of the miniature airplanes they made in a school contest. Only the pilot was injured—and he not seriously.

eastward movement is usual, smoke in great quantities from the northern Rockies is at times blown to the Pacific coast, and that from forest fires in the Lake region may invade the South. Time and again families and even communities have aroused themselves in the night to fight a forest fire, which they thought must be near by, though actually hundreds or even a thousand of miles away.

Dust from the Great Plains raised by a spring gale, may, similarly, pass eastward, to be precipitated one to three days later in mud rains or colored snow in the upper Mississippi Valley, the Lake region or even in northern New England, 1000 to 2000 miles away.

Free balloons, traveling as part of the wind, furnish still more definite data regarding air progress at different levels. Manned free balloons have frequently traveled 600 to 1000 miles in a day or two, making progress at times at over 60 miles an hour.
