

WHY THE WEATHER?

DR. CHARLES F. BROOKS Secretary, American Meteorological Society, Tells How

Dense Fogs—Why and When. Two types of fogs are common in autumn, the radiation fog and the steam fog. Conditions are especially favorable for a dense radiation fog when a thin moist layer of air lies near the ground with cold dry air above.

The other type of fog is the "steam" fog, frequently seen in fall, and in lowlands or valleys containing water merging with the radiation fog. It is this combination of both types that makes some harbors and river mouths so densely foggy some of these very cool autumn mornings.
