THE CRIME FOR WHICH BANDITS WERE HANGED

They Held Up Bank Car and Killed Henri Cleroux, a Messenger.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—The crime for which Tony Frank, Frank Gambino, Louis Morel and Giuseppe Serafini were hanged this morning was the holding up of a collection car of the Bank of Hochelaga on Tuesday afternoon, April 1st last, and the shooting and killing of a messenger, Henri Cleroux. Harry Stone, a notorious bandit and gunman, a member of the

gang, was also killed in this affair. The hold-up was the most sensational of its kind in the history of crime in Canada, if not on this continent. The collection car had been the rounds of a number of branches of the bank in the east end of the city and was taking to the head office a sum of money in the neighborhood of \$500,000. When it approached a subway under the Canadian Pacific railway tracks on Ontario street east, eight masked men surrounded it on all sides. The bank car had to stop on account of a car the bandits had placed across the narrow road. A bandit also cut the trolley wires to prevent street cars from approaching the spot. The bandits began shooting at the occupants of the bank car at once. The messengers returned fire,

Cleroux, who was driving the bank car, was soon mortally wounded and another employee was hit in the hand. The bandits ran a car alongside the collection car and one of their number boarded it and threw the money bags into the street, from which they were transferred to the robbers' automobile. The sum of \$142,188 was secured before men began to come to the assistance of the bank messengers. A traffic policeman off duty came on the scene and with the aid of some C.P.R. men drove the bandits away. While they were fleeing Stone was hit. The bandits when they found their car had been killed abandoned their car for another, driving it to the outskirts of the city where it too was left.

The First Clue.

The police got their first clue to the identity of the thieves when they found a telephone number written on a piece of paper in Stone's pocket. A visit to the house where the phone was that night resulted in the arrest of Giuseppe and Mrs. Serafini, Cleo Negro and his mistress Emma Leblanc. Later the police found a false cupboard in the place in which was hidden \$22,000. On April 23rd Emma Leblanc turned King's evidence and directly connected Serafini and Negro with the robbery.

On April 25th a man named Adam Parillo was arrested in Bridgeport, Conn., in whose possession was found \$7,900 in Canadian currency. The following day the police arrested Leo Davis, Tony Frank, Frank Gambino, Louis Morel, Mike Valentino and several other men. Only the five mentioned by name were detained. It was then announced that Negro had turned King's evidence and had described in detail to the police the whole carefully laid plot to rob the bank car. Morel, who was an ex-city detective and a fine athlete, appeared to be the ringleader. The others were all well-known in Montreal's underworld, particularly Frank.

The crown first tried Serafini, but the jury disagreed, six being in favor of a manslaughter verdict and six in favor of murder.

Guilty of Murder.

On June 7th the trial of all six for murder began and ended in a verdict of guilty of murder being brought in. They were sentenced to death by Mr. Justice Wilson. One of the features of the trial was the discovery that before their arrest Frank and Gambino, under assumed names, had been able to enter Bordeaux Jail and have a conference with Serafini and Negro.

On Aug. 26th Montreal was startled by the news that Serafini had nearly escaped from the jail, having, as a matter of fact, got out of the death cell in to the yard, and only the warning of a prisoner, who saw

him hide in a pig pen, had prevented his getting away. A number of jail guards were arrested charged with aiding Serafini to escape.

The appeals of all but Davis were dismissed on Sept. 30th. Davis' case was taken to the Supreme Court because the judges were not unanimous in dismissing his appeal. Morel was present at the hold-up and knew nothing about it until afterwards. Parillo and Mrs. Serafini have not yet been tried.

An aftermath of the case was an enquiry into police affairs before Mr. Justice Codrington which is still proceeding.

The dominion cabinet at an emergency meeting yesterday afternoon commuted the sentences of death on Leo Davis and Mike Valentino to life imprisonment. The four others were executed.

The police have been unable to recover nearly \$100,000 of the money stolen.

Missing School Girl Found Glad as Boy

New York, Oct. 24.—Julia Hanigan, 15-year old high school girl for whom the police had been looking since she disappeared from her Brooklyn home October 12th, was found yesterday in a men's lodging house in Brooklyn, attired in her brother's clothes. She had had her hair clipped and had masqueraded at the lodging house as a boy. For a week the police had worked on the theory that the girl had been

murdered, as the clothes she had discarded on leaving home were found buried in the cellar of the house.

100 Women Students Are Strangely Poisoned

Morgantown, W. Va., Oct. 24.—Poisoned by something they ate for

lunch on Monday, more than 100 women students at West Virginia university were confined to their rooms yesterday. While no critical cases developed, the attending physicians said many of the girls had had temperatures of 105. University officials are trying to determine what caused the poisoning.
