Canada's Part In British Election Campaign

While Canada and the Empire do not loom so largely as an issue in the present British election as they did last year when Stanley Baldwin challenged the electorate on the question of Empire preference, get the Dominion has a direct interest in the battle now being waged. Lord Beaverbrook is admittedly one of the forces which are exerting an enormous pressure in the shaping of the political destinies of the country, while at least seven Canadians are actually contesting seats.
