Belleville, Oct. 24.—Robert Sayers, of Consecon, 32 years of age, was drowned in Consecon Lake on Monday morning about nine o'clock. He was engaged in duck hunting and was using a small motor. The wind came up fresh and it being a frail craft was buffeted about considerably. He had just had a serious operation performed in May of this year and it is thought that his frailty caused a heart reaction and that he fell over the side of the duck skiff.
Mr. Sayers had resided in Consecon for some time and two years ago married Miss Leah Mastin, of Consecon, who survives, also a daughter, Donah. His widowed mother, Mrs. Emma Sayers, of Roslin, is left to mourn his loss besides five brothers, Harry at Roslin, Edward and Gerfield at Lucky Lake, Sask., Ray and John at Aneroid, Sask., two sisters Lila at Roslin, and Mrs. Sam Carter, of Tyendinaga.
He was a Methodist in religion and a member of the Orange order.
