DR. JAMES CAPPON'S VIEW OF THE RESULT

Aburd for Half the People to Coerce the Other Half, He Says.

When interviewed by the Whig Friday morning, Dr. James Cappon, vice-president of the Kingston Moderation League, and one of Ontario's leaders in the work of that organization, made the following statement: "Kingston increased its previous majority against prohibition substantially and that in spite of the great preponderance of prohibition workers at the polling stations and the numerous prohibition meetings and rallies. "As to the general result in the province, I have only to say that the immense reduction of the prohibitionist majority from over 400,000 to about 30,000 shows what a few years' experience of the working of prohibition has done to change the mind of the country. It is only rural districts where there is little knowledge of the larger social and economic conditions of life that enabled the prohibition party to get even this small majority. The rural constituencies were practically undefended and lay at the mercy of well-meaning, but rather fanatical pulpit orators. Any way the fact that something like fifty per cent of the voting population is allowed to coerce the other fifty per cent in the case of a social habit, which has always been recognized as lawful all over the civilized world, is an absurdity which our governments should never have permitted to occur. It creates a situation which can never be considered settled or satisfactory. Something like sixty or seventy per cent majority at least would be necessary to make a prohibitory law of such a type effective or useful."

HOW ONTARIO VOTED IN LAST PLEBISCITE

A Great Change in the Opinion of the People of Ontario Now.

Following are figures, as assembled by the Prohibition Union of Canada, showing the result of the voting on the liquor question in Ontario in November, 1919, when the electorate was asked to vote for or against continuance of the Ontario Temperance Act. There has been one vote on the liquor question since then, in May, 1921, in Ontario. This vote, however, was practically a Federal Government referendum to settle the question of importation of liquor by private individuals. The 1919 vote is analogous to the present plebiscite, in that it asked for an expression of opinion on whether or not the O.T.A. should be abolished, and whether or not a more extensive sale of liquor, under Government control, should be permitted in Ontario.

On the question in 1919—"Are you in favor of the repeal of the O.T.A.?"—574,348 votes were cast in the affirmative and 777,537 against. Two other questions, dealing with the sale of light wines and beers answered in the negative by a majority of approximately 250,000 votes. On a fourth question, dealing with Government control such as is proposed in this year's ballot, the same number of votes were cast, but the majority against Government control was about 240,000, whereas the majority against the abolition of the O.T.A. was 407,289.
