**MODERATION LEAGUE LOOKS FOR CONCESSION**

 that government came from those centres which have now voted in favor of government control.

**Praises The Whig.**  
 Another prominent member of the Moderation League expressed similar ideas and gave the Whig a boost when he said: "I am a Conservative and a supporter of the so-called 'wets,' but irrespective of the result of the plebiscite vote I must right here say that the Whig's service to the public on the results was the best I have seen in any election."

The Kingston Branch of the Moderation League is very much pleased with the local results. There is a gain of over one hundred and fifty on the last "wet" majority registered in Kingston and the leaders said this morning that, in their opinion, fully ninety per cent. of Kingston's male vote was for Government Control.

**Government Up Against It.**  
 Kingston business men generally had a variety of opinions concerning the vote. In most cases they expressed only a private opinion and would not talk for publication. Along the lines of its effect on business they had very little to say though many of them thought financial conditions would have benefited by government control. Even some of the O.T.A. supporters admitted this but claimed that the resulting evils would far surpass in importance the financial gain.

B. N. Steacy, head of Steacy's Limited, and president of the Board of Trade, said: "I have not much to say either way and nothing whatever as the spokesman of any club or organization. But, as a personal opinion, from a political standpoint I cannot see how the Ontario Government can enforce the O.T.A. in those sections which voted so strongly against it."

The majority for the O.T.A., while a healthy one, is so small in comparison with the large number of voters in the province that the position is rather delicate, appears to be the general view. Business men were unanimous in the opinion that the Ferguson Government is in a tight box to-day but few care to make any statement one way or another as yet.

**TELEPHONE SERVICE WAS THE VERY BEST**

The Operators at Central Did Great Service for the Whig.

The twenty-three girls, who were on duty at the Bell Telephone office on Thursday evening, had one of the busiest times on record. The two telephones at the Whig office were kept busy from six o'clock until after twelve o'clock and again on Friday morning commencing about eight o'clock. The service was excellent and the management of the Whig is grateful to the operators. The telephone company realized that there would be thousands of calls and with this view arranged to have all the staff on duty, with Miss Stella Dwyer, assistant chief operator, in charge.

On Friday morning, when speaking to the traffic manager, the Whig learned that under ordinary busy hours each operator would answer on an average of 245 calls and on Thursday evening this average ran up to 270 calls for each operator, which is considered a record.

The majority of the calls were from people who called the newspapers for the purpose of getting the election results.

The long-distance operators were kept on the jump for some hours with people who were either giving or asking the newspapers for the results of the election in the city and province. It was estimated that there was an increase of 400 per cent. in the number of long distance calls for any night on Thursday evening.

Whig reporters had occasion to use the long distance many times to get the results from the county, and they are loud in their praise for the excellent service given by the operators. The Whig had calls from all parts of the country, and the operators went to a great deal of trouble to get quick connections.
