HUNTERS.

Canadian Pacific Railway.
 The hunting season being close at
 hand, the exodus of sportsmen to the
 Highlands of Northern Frontenac
 along the line of the Canadian Pac-
 fic Ry. north of Sharbot Lake is get-
 ting under way.

This section of the County of
 Frontenac offers the greatest deer
 hunting grounds in the province.
 Partridge and other game abound,
 and are within accessible distances
 from the stations for the hunters.

THE C.P.R. Assessment.
 The total assessment of the C.P.
 R. in Pembroke for 1925 is fixed at
 \$143,500 as against the former as-
 sessment of \$58,000. The increase
 is \$85,500, or rather more than 150
 per cent. The assessment stands for
 a period of five years, known as the
 "quinquennial term," unless there
 are changes of ownership or an in-
 crease in the number of buildings.
 In such cases the additions would
 be assessed without any interference
 with the quinquennial term. On
 the present rate of taxation, fifty-
 three mills on the dollar, the set-
 tlement means that the amount of
 taxes to be paid to the municipality
 will be \$7,605.50, an increase of
 \$4,531.50 over the former revenue
 of \$3,074 a year, which should aid
 materially in bringing down the
 rate of taxation next year.
