Varsity Downed Hamilton Rowers in Senior O.R.F.U. Fixture.

Hamilton, Oct. 26.—Tigers had no difficulty in maintaining their place as unbeaten leaders of the Big Four. They handed Montreal, the only team they claimed to fear in the Union, an unmerciful trouncing here to-day before 5,000 people. The score was 20 to 1. The Montreal team played a terribly ragged game and were beaten by their own errors. The wing line failed to stand up to the assault of the Tigers' line plungers, they were easily tricked by the Arrey plays, and when they were given the ball to carry in their own formations did some disastrous fumbling.

With the wind and sun behind them they held Tigers 1 to 0 in the first period but in the second Tigers booted for three singles and were presented with an almost free touch-down when Montreal lost the ball on their own 5-yard line through a fumble. Two plunges took the ball across for the touch which made it 10 to 0 at half time. In the third period Montreal showed a little strength and got the only point scored during that stanza.

In the final period Tigers were all over the Montrealers and won going away. The Tiger line had all the better of the line play while Gibb and Quinn turned in smart games behind the line.

Jeff Russell was the only man to show anything startling on the Montreal team. His tackling was great. He stood up gamely under a tremendous grunting. Evans played a fair game but Gardner was easily out-punted by Gibb. Montreal backs were nailed in their tracks by Tigers' four great outside wings, Main, Walker, McFarlane and Weaver.
