The basis of the agreement is that The Molsons Bank shareholders will receive two shares of Bank of Montreal stock for three shares of Molsons Bank stock, and, in addition, a cash bonus of \$10 for each Molsons Bank share.

The Molsons Bank shareholders will receive their regular quarterly divident on 1st January next, and the shares received from the Bank of Montreal for distribution to The Molsons Bank shareholders will rank for regular dividend as and from 1st | to keep them.
