SELECTIVE IMMIGRATION.

Was a Subject Before the I.O.D.E. Convention. Selective immigration was on the carpet on Wednesday afternoon at the meeting of the Ontario Provincial Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire in London, Ont. Following the presentation and acceptance of a resolution regarding the education of immigrants, Mrs. C. E. Burden, Toronto, rose to propose a resolution to the federal government, respectively urging even greater care in the choice of immigrants to Canada. "If this is not done we shall find ourselves in the position of our neighbors to the south," Mrs. Burden said. Discussion elicited a number of similar opinions. Miss Wilhelmina Gordon, Kingston, advised great care in the presentation of such a resolution, which, she pointed out, must pass through the channels of the National I.O.D.E. to the federal government. "Look at the question from all sides," Miss Gordon urged. "Isn't it possible that great care is being taken in this matter by the government? We don't want to seem to show lack of judgment in the wording of our requests." Eventually the resolution was referred back.
