

Making Stranded-Wire Cables

Having had considerable difficulty in obtaining good seven-stranded cable for guy wires, a mechanic hit upon the fol-lowing method of making it himself: He jacked up one of the rear wheels of his car and fastened one end of a coil of galvanised-iron wire to one of the spokes brought the wire around a fencepost, directly in line with the wheel, and attached it to the opposite spoke of the wheel, cutting it from the coil at this point. 
