NORTHERN ONTARIO IN WINTER'S GRIP

Near-Zero Weather and Heavy Snow Follows Month of Warmth.

North Bay, Nov. 4.—King Winter laid his white mantle over Northern Ontario yesterday. North Bay and environs had enjoyed nearly a month of almost summer-like weather, but cold winds Sunday and enough frost to cause ice, foretold the arrival yesterday afternoon of snow, which has been falling steadily for four hours, and at six o'clock it was between two and three inches deep.

The temperature dropped almost to zero at Timmins, and snow began to fall at eleven o'clock yesterday morning, and continued all afternoon, but a south-east wind resulted in a welcome rise of temperature.

Other points in the north section report snow, and it is believed to be fairly general.
