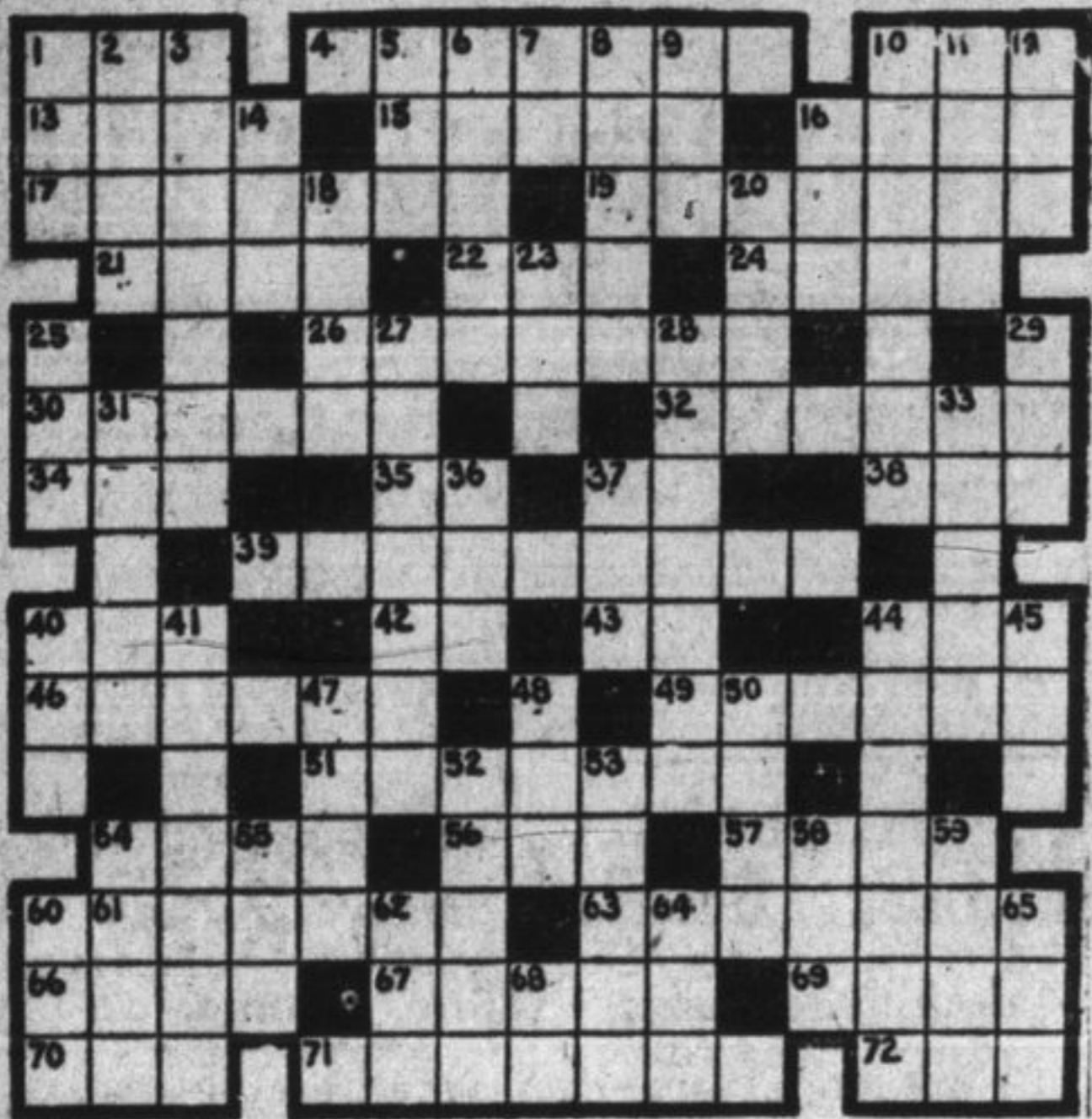


CROSS-WORDPUZZLE

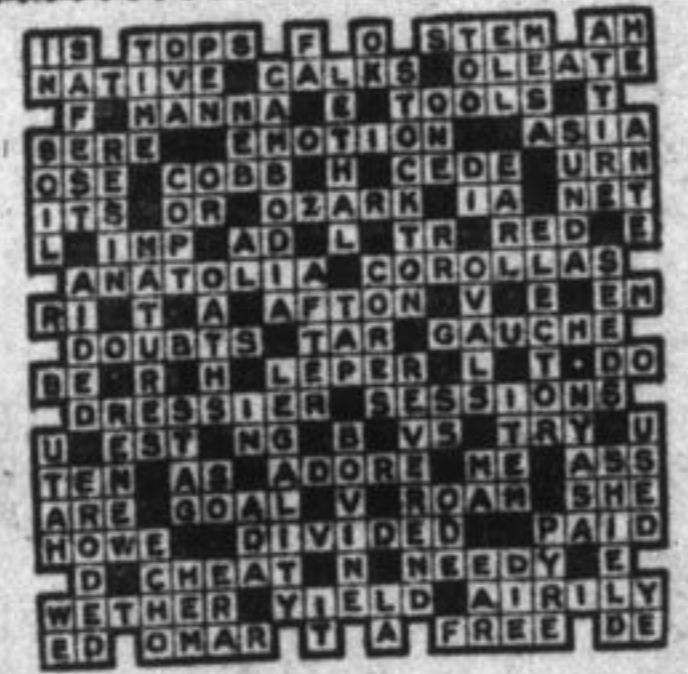

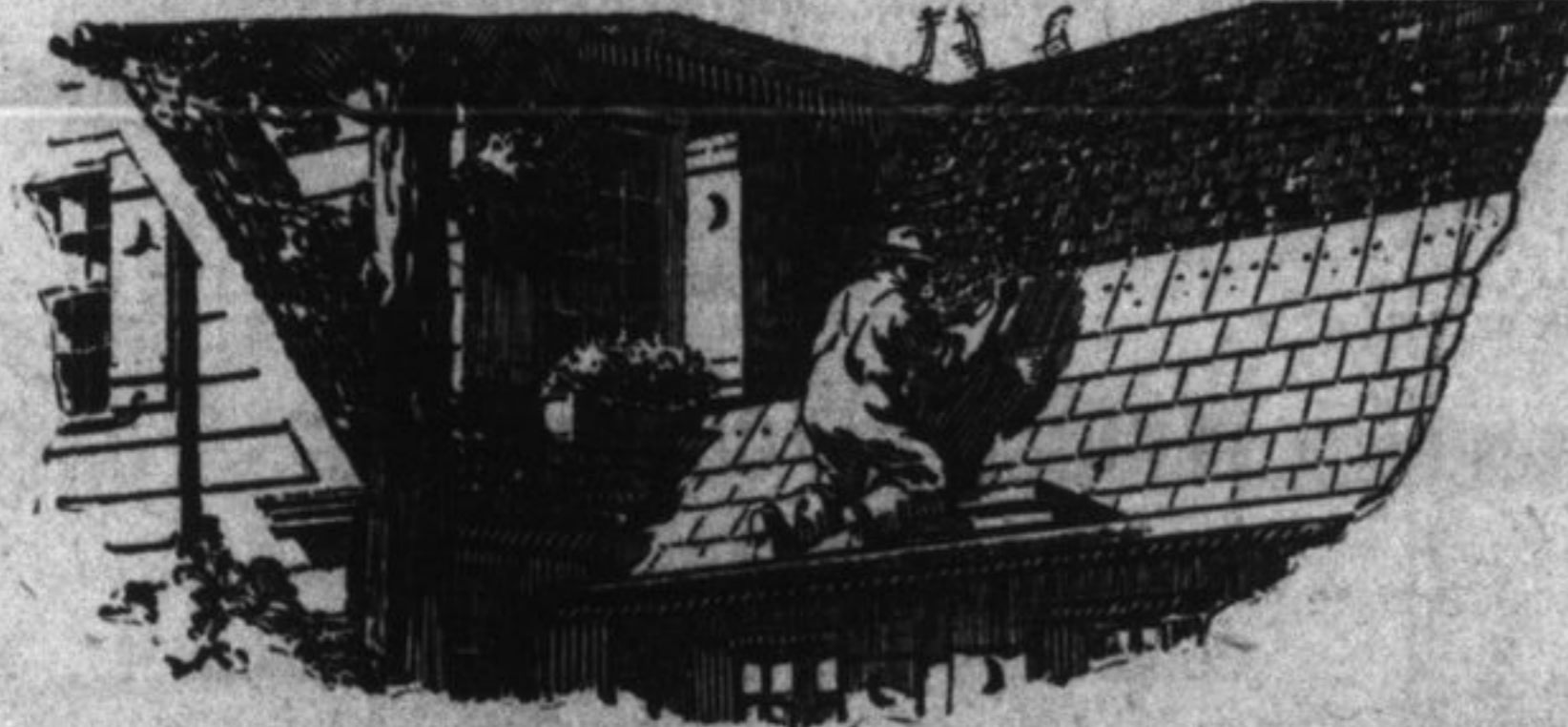
