

County Council Asks the C.N.R. to Place Light and Bell for Warning.

When the county council resumed its sessions on Thursday afternoon the good roads committee had held mittee was able to make a report in connection with the new siding at Findley station over which there was so much discussion on Wednes-

After going into the case very arefully, the committee decided that the railway company be asked to place a wig-wag light and bell at this crossing to warn the people who have to cross the track. The C.N.R. will also be asked not to allow a train to remain on the siding within three hundred and fifty feet to the east or two hundred feet west, as it will keep the travelling public from getting a look down the track.

When the report was moved and seconded, it was adopted by the council, and J. M. Farrell, county solicitor, and R. J. Fair, county road superintendent, will take the matter up with the railway company.

A vote of thanks was tendered by the good roads committee to Reeve Samuel Jamieson, the chairman, who has done such faithful work during the year. Mr. Jamieson in replying stated that it was a pleasure to work with the different members of the committee. The county property committee re-
