BALDWIN GOVERNMENT REJECTS TREATIES

Made With Russia by the Labor Government of Ramsay MacDonald. London, Nov. 22.—Austin Chamberlain, secretary of state for foreign affairs, in a note to M. Rakovsky, Soviet charge d'affaires, formally denounced yesterday the two treaties with the Russian soviet concluded by Ramsay MacDonald and Arthur Ponsonby, while the former was prime minister and foreign secretary in the late Labor government.

Trade Boards Go on Record For a Downward Revision of Federal Income Tax.

A Tariff Commission Is Also Favored—J. G. Elliott, of Kingston, Is Elected As the President. Toronto, Nov. 22.—Reciprocal empire preference, appointment of a tariff commission to deal with adjustments to the Canadian tariff; negative attitude toward proposals to restore the gold standard in Canada; downward revision of federal income tax; immediate development of St. Lawrence water power and the deep waterways system; opposition to the proposed diversion of the waters of the Hudson Bay slope to the upper reaches of the St. Lawrence basin; protection for shipbuilding yards of the dominion, and lower postage rates to foreign countries—these are the latest additions to the policy of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce as announced yesterday at the concluding sessions of the annual meeting of that organization.

ADMITS RELATIONS WITH POTENTATE The Alleged Pawn in English Extortion Case Is On The Stand.

London, Nov. 22.—A pretty blond English woman, fashionably gowned, testified for five hours here yesterday afternoon of her intimate relations with an eastern potentate of fabulous wealth, which have rocked England and threaten an international scandal.

BRITISH NOTE ABOUT READY TO REQUIRE SECURITY

Fuad And Zaghlul Are Held Responsible For the Anti-European Atmosphere. London, Nov. 22.—Within the next 24 hours Lord Alenby is expected to present to the Egyptian Government a strong note upon the assassination of Sirdar Stack. Although the British Government has no intention of altering the present status of Egypt or the Sudan, it will make certain definite demands which will give it greater security against a repetition to such outrages.

Dominions Kept In Close Touch With the Situation in Egypt—The New Policy of British Premier.

London, Nov. 22.—The situation in Egypt is supplying a sudden and serious test for the plan inaugurated by Mr. Baldwin in seeking the close co-operation of the dominions in affairs affecting the Empire. Egypt was one of the subjects discussed at the "tea party" at Downing street last Tuesday.

MUST BE SPECIFIC BOOTLEGGING PROOF No Breach Of O. T. A. For Man To Boast He Is A Bootleg.

Toronto, Nov. 22.—"It is not a breach of the Ontario Temperance Act for a person to say that he is a bootlegger," said Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general, when asked if prosecution would be instituted in the case of Romeo Perry, Hamilton man, who recently gave an interview along that line.

DECISION TO DOUBLE THE IRON ORE BOUNTY Is Expected to Result in Active Development of Ontario Resources.

Port Arthur, Nov. 22.—Premier Ferguson's announcement that it is the intention of the Government to increase the bounty on iron ore from a half cent per metallic unit to one cent, is regarded here as the most important news the northwest part of the province has had in many years.

REID FOUND GUILTY. Sentenced To Twelve Months Imprisonment for Manslaughter.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 22.—Leonard Reid, son of the late Sir William Reid, founder and one-time head of the Reid-Newfoundland Railroad, was found guilty by a jury in the Supreme Court here yesterday of manslaughter. He was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.

Widow Is Arrested For Killing Student.

Lebanon, Tenn., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Pearl Baskin, a widow, is under arrest here as the result of the fatal shooting at her home of Paul Patterson, 21, of Springfield, Mo., a law student of Cumberland university and son of a former congressman from Missouri.

German Weds Sister Of Air Service Foe.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 22.—Two air pilots, a German and an American, fought a thrilling duel in the air over Dijon, France, during the world war. The German was captured after being wounded by gunfire from the American's plane.
