Sentenced To Twelve Months Imprisonment for Manslaughter. With the Situation in Egypt---The New Policy of British

London, Nov. 22 .- The situation in Egypt is supplying a sudden and serious test for the plan inaugurated by Mr. Baldwin in seeking the close co-operation of the Dominions in affairs affecting the Empire. Egypt was one of the subjects discussed at the "tea party" at Downing street last Tuesday. The murder of Sir Lee Stack has of course made the situation infinitely more serious. The Dominions are accordingly being kept in close touch with every development by the British Government. To Australia, New Zealand and South Africa everything which affects the security of the Suez Canal is of course of prime importance. Canada has not the same vital interest in the question, but if armed intervention in Egypt became necessary in Egypt, the Canadian Government would eventually have to register its sympathies in some fashion.

Breach Of O. T. A. For Man To Boast He Is A Bootleg.

Toronto, Nov. 22 .- "It is not a breach of the Ontario Temperance Act for a person to say that he is a bootlegger," said Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorneygeneral, when asked if prosecution would be instituted in the case of Rocco Perri, Hamilton man, who recently gave an interview along that line.

Mr. Nickle said that there must be specific evidence of the illegal sale of liquor before any action could be taken.

Says Bye-Election Does Not Affect the Government.

Of the Electors Upon Old Institutions And Customs of Parliament.

Belleville, Nov. 22 .- Premier Mac-Kenzie King, who spoke here last night in the opera house before 1,500 people, was compelled to speak later to an over-flow meeting of over 1,000 people in the armonies which had gathered to hear him champion the cause of Charles Hanna, Liberal candidate in the byeelection to be held here Tuesday

The issue of the bye-election was placed on a high plane. It will not render a verdict that will affect the government, which has a lease of power for one or two years yet, said the premier. It is not a verdict on James Murdock that can be given, but it is a judgment which the electors will give as to whether they are anxious that institutions and customs of parliament, which have all been preserved in the investigation of the Murdock charges, shall be overthrown. The bye-election, the premier said, was brought on by the act of E. Guss Porter and was not occasioned in any way by acts of the government.

"You have been told the issue is a moral one. I hope you will keep it on that high plane. But I see they are rapidly dropping it. Since Mr. Meighen has come into the riding he has spoken of such other issues as the tariff. I wish to speak of the moral issue in this campaign and to keep it to the fore," said the premier.
