> In some, the thyroid did not get perceptibly smaller, and yet the heart action became slower, normal

in fact. In others, the thyroid became normal and the heart also. This gave a new light on things. because it showed that the enlarged thyroid was not the direct cause of the rapid heart, but that the heart action was increased, and the thyroid enlarged by the same thing,

namely poison in the blood. Any poison in the blood is going to disturb the heart action, causing a fast and often irregular beat, because the muscle of the heart can be effected, just like any other tis-

sue in the body. Now although most of the simple goltres are caused by a lack of iodine in the system, this knowledge that poison from any infected part of the body may be causing them, is certainly worth knowing.

Further, that rapid heart action, for irregular action that has been mystifying or worrying you, may be due to some simple infection from teeth, tonsils, gums, sinuses about the nose, gall bladder, or intestine. Let your doctor look you over.
