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## Canadian Pacific Canada's Heaviest Taxpayer

IN the five years, 1919-1923, inclusive, the Canadian Pacific paid into the revenues of the country in taxes of all kinds the huge total of \$31,666,830.08.

Canada has received back in taxes from the Canadian Pacific much of its own capital investment and, in addition, dividends in benefits which, if they could be calculated in dollars, would amount to hundreds of times the original cost of the Canadian Pacific to the country.
