 at 323,313.

The Fine Was Paid.
 A fine of \$50 was imposed by
 Judge Deroche on Michael Ryan,
 Marmora township, found guilty of
 assaulting and occasioning grievous
 bodily harm to David Flynn. On
 July 18th the accused and plaintiff
 had some words with the result that
 Ryan hit Flynn and he fell. In fall-
 ing a bone in his leg was broken.
 As there was alleged to have been
 some justification on the part of
 Ryan for doing what he did, a fine
 was imposed. It was paid.

The Flow of Milk.
 With winter closing down, the an-
 nual change in milk marketing is
 taking place in Eastern Ontario.
 Cheese factories are closed or clos-
 ing everywhere, and milk is once
 more being separated or shipped in
 fluid form to city markets. "The
 quantity of cream being marketed
 shows an increase of about ten per
 cent. over last year," writes A. W.
 Sirett, Kingston. "This is due to
 the closing of the cheese factories
 with a fairly good flow of milk com-
 ing in." Much the same report from
 Hastings Prince Edward and other
 dairy counties.
