



At the Ontario Municipal Electric Association meeting held in Toronto Nov. 26th, to consider the St. Lawrence development, Ex-Mayor Newman of Picton, presented a resolution pointing out that in a circular issued by the Canadian Deep Waterways Association, government ownership and control of power development was favored as opposed t municipal ownership and also payment by power users of the total cost of a proposed ship canal from Lake Ontario to Montreal. The resolution, declaring the Hydro Association to be opposed to the methods urged in the Deep Waterways Circular as being an attempt to interfere with municipal rights and to place an unfair burden on the power users of the province, was passed unani-
