LATE IRWIN D. JOHNSTON.

Brother of Mrs. R. J. McKevey Dies in Montreal.

Stricken in the prime of life, Capt. Irwin Donaldson Johnston, journalist and soldier, died yesterday at the residence of his mother, 25 Crescent street, following a struggle of some years against tuberculosis, to which he fell a victim largely owing to strenuous service overseas, in the course of which he was badly gassed. He was 45 years of age, and up to a month ago had been able to get outdoors. Over three years ago he had been compelled for health reasons to relinquish his duties as financial editor of The Gazette, which he carried out for two years.

Irwin D. Johnston was born at Kingston, Ont., on Dec. 7th, 1879, the son of the late Capt. Gilbert Johnston, who for many years was connected with Montreal, being in the service of the old Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company Steamships Lines. He received his primary education at Kingston, and was for a short time in the employ of the Merchants Bank at Chatham, Ont. Coming to Montreal he studied in Arts at McGill, and then passed into the ranks of newspaper work, serving in turn on the staffs of the Montreal Star, the Montreal Daily Mail and the Montreal Herald. On these papers he did general reporting work, but on the first named became assistant financial editor, and he played a considerable part in exposing the fraud of the St. James street "ret-ri-quer" venture.

Responding to the call for men in the Great War, Irwin Johnston enlisted as a bombardier in the 35th Howitzer Battery, which was raised at Sherbrooke, generally known as "Fletcher's Battery." In France he saw active service around Vimy Ridge and on the Somme, but on account of the death of his father he obtained special leave in the middle of the war and returned to Canada, having received his commission overseas. Here he was seconded to the Department of Public Information at Ottawa as Canadian representative of the Canadian Daily Record, which was published overseas for the benefit of the C. E. F.

With the cessation of the soldiers' war paper, Mr. Johnston came to Montreal, joining the staff of The Gazette early in 1919 as financial editor. That appointment he held with satisfaction until April, 1921, when his health necessitated giving up the arduous life of a journalist.

Mr. Johnston married Miss Janet Johnstone, of Brockville, who survives him. There were no children. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Gilbert Johnston, of 25 Crescent street, as well as by one brother, Gilbert J., of Chicago, and three sisters, Mrs. H. L. Crosswell, of Oranston, B.C.; Mrs. R. J. McKevey, of Kingston, Ont., and Mrs. F. R. Phelan, of Montreal.
