Planning the Christmas Dinner. The experienced housewife will not feel the need of help in planning the Christmas Dinner but perhaps the bride will find the following suggestions useful:

Menu: Celery, Olives, Chicken Consomme, Roast Goose with Potato Stuffing, Mashed White Potatoes, Glazed Sweet Potatoes, Cauliflower, Apple Sauce, Creamed Onions, Plum Pudding, Mince and Pumpkin Pies, and Coffee. (If desired the onions or the cauliflower may be omitted.)

Roast Goose: Singe, remove pinfeathers, then scrub the goose in hot soapsuds. Draw (that is, remove inside contents) and wash in cold water, wiping carefully. Now stuff, truss, sprinkle with pepper and salt and lay eight slices of salt pork (thinly cut) over the breast. Put the bird on the rack in your dripping pan, slip the pan into a hot oven, and roast for two hours, basting every 15 minutes with the fat in the pan. During the last half hour of cooking remove the pork slices. Place the cooked goose on a platter cut the string and remove it, and the skewers, and serve.

Potato Stuffing for Goose: Mash ten hot boiled potatoes and add one-

third cup of melted butter, one cup of rich sweet top milk or thin cream, three beaten eggs, and three medium-size raw onions finely chopped. Beat this mixture for several minutes, then season with one-teaspoon of salt and a generous pinch of pepper and beat again, before using it to stuff the bird.

Plum Pudding: This should be made well in advance of Christmas, but young housekeepers who have neglected to do so still have time to make it although it will not be as well seasoned as if it were older. Put beef suet through your food chopper, then measure; you will need one cupful, well packed down. Turn suet into a bowl and stir with a fork till lightly separated, then add to it two and two-thirds cups of stale white bread crumbs and the yolks of four eggs, which have been whipped with one and one-fourth cups of brown sugar. Also add one tablespoon of vinegar, the grated rind of one lemon, and the following fruits mixed together: One cup of raisins seeded and cut in bits, three-fourths of a cup of dried currants, and one cup of grated raw carrot; dredge these with one-third cup of flour to which you have previously added one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-half teaspoon of grated nutmeg, a generous pinch of ground cloves, and one teaspoon of salt. Last, fold four stiffly-whipped egg whites into the pudding, turn all into a buttered mould, cover and sink the mould in boiling water for four hours.

Tenth Anniversary Of the Great War

Dec. 21st, 1914.

The German line is thrown still farther back, and is reported to have evacuated Ostend. The Allies are clearing the whole Belgian coast of Germans. British and French take up new advanced positions in northern France and in Belgium.

The submarine blockade is advocated by Admiral Von Tirpitz, German marine minister. He says his fleet is too small to offer battle to that of Britain. The German admiral says that big warships have not become obsolete and he does not think much of the seaplane invasions.

Many members of the 21st Battalion leave for home to spend Christmas. Donations for the Christmas dinner for the soldiers are being received.

The British squadron off the Belgian coast on Monday night shelled Zeebrugge and Ostend, dismantling the German guns and scattering the engineers, who were trying to build fortifications.

The Portuguese chamber has voted in favor of preparation to join Great Britain in the war. This followed the announcement by the colonial minister that the German forces had again invaded Portuguese territory in Africa.

A letter was received from Prof. J. M. Lanois, telling about the real conditions existing in France. He says that the people in Paris have lots to eat.

The British aviators again dropped bombs on Zeppelin sheds in Cologne and caused the destruction of several buildings.

Ten Germans were arrested at New Orleans charged with plotting

internal machines on ships of horses destined for Britain.

Boat Lottie is Recovered. The pleasure boat Lottie, owned by Captain Samuel B. Massey, proprietor of the St. Lawrence Inn, Alexandria Bay, N.Y., which was burned and sank in the river a week ago, was found floating near the spot where it sank on Saturday. Capt. Massey was notified and Joseph Brown went to the spot with his tug and towed it to the Bay. The boat lies up the creek near the Brown boat-house.

Going to South America. Miss Mary Donoghue, graduate of the general hospital and a former supervisor at that institution, has left for her home at Oxford Mills to visit her family before going to Lima, Peru, in South America, where she has accepted a nursing contract in one of the large hospitals for a period of three years. Miss Donoghue is very well known.

Perth Collegiate Wins. Principal Hardy has been notified by Capt. V. W. S. Heron, district cadet officer, that Perth collegiate rifle team has won the Laura Secord shield, emblematic of the cadet rifle shooting championship of Eastern Ontario. Perth collegiate had a total score of 966 out of a possible 1,000. The nearest competitor was Belleville high school with a score of 952.
