 a score of 734. This is the first time
 that a Queen's team has won the
 university cup McGill University
 was second with 718, University of
 Toronto third with 688, University
 of Manitoba fourth with 687, and
 University of Alberta fifth with 637.
 D. T. Burke, of Queen's Octette shar-
 ed honors with H. J. Wood, of Mc-
 GILL, as the highest individual scorer
 with 99 out of a possible 105.

Opening of Stone Quarry.
 The final meeting of the year of
 the city council has been called for
 Monday evening and Mayor Thomas
 Angrove will bring up the matter of
 having the city's stone quarry open-
 ed in order to help out the unem-
 ployment situation. The mayor states
 that some action has to be taken to
 assist the men who cannot get work,
 and states that the stone quarry
 would provide some work.
 The city council at London, Ont.,
 has written the Kingston council,
 asking that the local council co-
 operate with the members there, in
 an appeal to be made to the govern-
 ment at Toronto and Ottawa, on be-
 half of the unemployed.

Crushed Beneath a Log.
 A fatal accident occurred on the
 farm of Philip Moran, Wooler, on
 Monday. Last winter a lot of logs
 had been cut in the woods till at
 present, when Peter Whaley and
 some were hired to cut them into
 wood, and in some manner a top log
 became loosened and rolled down,
 passing over Mr. Whaley. He was
 at once removed from the woods and
 a doctor sent for, but he expired be-
 fore reaching his home and before
 the doctor arrived. Mr. Whaley was
 a man of about seventy years of age,
 and had run a small blacksmith
 shop for a number of years on the
 Wooler and Trenton provincial-high-
 way, near the top of the long grade
 three miles southeast of Wooler.

Made Chief Inspection Officer.
 Re-organization of the legal in-
 spection branch of the Attorney-
 General's department was heralded
 at the parliament buildings, in the
 announcement of the appointment of
 I. A. Humphries, lawyer, Campbell-
 ford, to the position of chief inspec-
 tion officer. Until recently the At-
 torney-General's department has
 had an inspector of registry offices,
 an inspector of division courts, and
 an inspector of magisterial and legal
 offices. Under this system as many
 as three inspectors would visit a city
 such as Kingston, each official visit-
 ing only one office. Reorganization
 will do away with overlapping.
