

TOWNS TO-BENEFIT BY LIQUOR FINES Local Briefs Gathered by Re-

Saskatchewan Municipalities Will Get All the Proceeds Now.

Regina, Dec. 22.-A windfall is coming to the rural and urban municipalities of Saskatchewan under the provisions of the new Liquor Bill. At the suggestion of Hon. J. A.

Cross, attorney-general, all the fines imposed under the Liquor Act will be handed over to the municipalities in all cases where information leading to conviction is given by municipal authorities, it was decided by the legislature on the Liquor Bill. Originally the bill provided for a

fifty-fifty split of the fines between the province and the municipalities, the provision being the same as in the Saskatchewan Temperance Act.
