The Dominion Observatory at Ottawa has issued a booklet on the approaching eclipse of the sun which will take place on the morning of Jan. 24th. Kingston is unfortunately not in the path of total eclipse, but only a thin segment of the sun, somewhat like a new moon, will remain visible. In Kingston, the first contact will occur at 8.02 a.m.; the time of maximum eclipse

will be at 9.11 and the end will be at 10.37.

KINGSTON IN 1855

Sidelights From Our Files - A Backward Look.

A DISQUALIFIED MAYOR.

March 10. - (Action has been brought against Mayor Counter to disqualify him on the grounds of his being a shareholder to the extent of \$140 in the City of Kingston Gas Light Co., a company which had a contract with the municipality of which he was alderman and mayor). The quotation is from the conclusion of Judge McKenzie's decision: "I cannot but express my deep regret that a gentleman like the defendant, who has filled the office of chief magistrate of the city, I believe, no less than eight times, whose name is more intimately associated with the history of its rise and progress and improvements than that of any other and who for enterprise, energy and public spirit has few equals in it, should be dispossessed from the chief magistracy of the city upon a dry technical plea of law. But I have no choice in this matter, and as the defendant was at the time of his election to the office of alderman for Victoria Ward, a stockholder in the Kingston Gas Light Company, and because that company at the same time had a contract with the mayor, alderman and commonality of the City of Kingston, his election was therefore null and void and his (subsequent) election to the office of mayor was equally void by reason of his not being a legal alderman. Therefore I do adjudge and determine that the defendant do not in any manner concern himself in or about the said offices, but that he be absolutely forejudged and excluded from further using or exercising the same under pretence of the said elections, and that a proper writ of mandamus do issue to

the aldermen and commonality of the City of Kingston, commanding them to hold another election for Victoria Ward for the purpose of electing another alderman, and to elect another mayor for the City of Kingston.

Tenth Anniversary Of the Great War

Dec. 24th, 1914.

The Germans are now giving stubborn resistance and are seeking to regain the ground they have lost. Allies advances have not been extensive as heretofore reported. Brilliant resistance by Zouaves repulsed the attacks of the enemy. Fog has stopped operations at Arras and the sand dunes were mined.

The prisoners at Fort Henry will not be forgotten, as the militia department has arranged to give each man a splendid Christmas dinner. Turkey and plum pudding are on the menu and the foreigners will not have a chance to say that they were forgotten at Christmas in Canada.

British censors having "shut up shop" at 9 a.m. Tuesday till 4 p.m. Friday, there will be no official war news coming through. After the regular 7 p.m. service to-night, the war service will completely cease till eight o'clock Friday morning unless there is exceptionally important news.

The Indian troops are the surprise of the campaign in France. Their endurance fighting ability and coolness in face of fire command attention. They are well drilled and disciplined.

Russia has strengthened her position near Warsaw and occupies strong positions along the Bura that effectively bar the German advance on Warsaw. Meanwhile the grand duke has flung all his available forces like a thunderbolt at the advancing Australians in Galicia.

Emperor William is travelling in a special armoured train among his troops scattered along the Belgium and French fronts, delivering them the seasons greetings.
